MRS. GLOVER TO RE-MARRY

Widow of Waltham Murderer in Love Match With Southern Doctor Whom She Met at LeBlanc Trial.

Cambridge, Mass., Dec. 17.—Mrs. Lillian M. Glover, joyfully declared yesterday that she is to be married within a year.

A wealthy physician in Washington, one who writes her long and delightful letters, so she said, is the man, and although she declined to mention his name, she averred herself very happy over this, the latest in the tangle of affairs resulting from the murder of her husband in the laundry at Waltham.

With the echoes of the trial still resounding through the state, and with the LeBlanc family and their friends steeped in the joy of the trial's result, the "mysterious widow" calmly announced her intended nuptials.

"He is a typical southerner," she said, speaking of her husband-to-be. "He is a physician, very rich, and a native of Washington."

The birth of this new romance in the life of Mrs. Glover occurred, so she said yesterday, about a short 10 days ago.

"The day that I was on the witness stand, all day the doctor realized a keen interest in me. Letters from him followed rapidly and now I receive even as many as six bulky ones in one day.

"I am very happy over it. I am tired of this notoriety and this will enable me to forget the whole terrible business."

LA TEST GOSSIP FROM LONDON

Fashionable Women to Adopt Pockets Like Those of U. S. Jackies--Queen Mary to Revive Old Custom of Decorating Rooms--Japanese Competition Alarms British Industries.

London, Dec. 15.—The diagonal breast pockets in the jackets of the American sailors, now a vogue in this country, seem to be exciting a great deal of interest among women in London, and in all probability the device will be adapted for future feminine fashions.

Miss Mary Bateman, who organized the first woman's bank in England, has given up banking for novel writing. It was a bold project to launch a bank run by women," she says, "but the experiment has been a huge success. At the outset we had to face a great amount of prejudice, but that has now to a large extent been overcome. The undertaking has clearly demonstrated that women are quite competent to transact banking business."

"But I have learned that the business of a bank manager possesses far greater human interest than ever I could have imagined. One would be surprised to find that his duties are hedged in by pounds, shillings and pence, finance figures and heavy ledgers. The exact opposite is the reality of the position. I have come to the conclusion that there is no more human profession than that of bank manager. Personally plays a great part in it. A bank manager who is to be successful must gain the whole-hearted trust of his clients, for his counsel is sought on many points."

"I have been astonished to find that there are people in the world who could walk into a bank parlor and lay bare their worries and troubles, and some of my clients have. They confided everything to me."

New York cable despatches have told of the argument of J. Alexander, the portrait painter, and of Dr. Dudley Allen Sargent, of Harvard, concerning the effect of athletics on the physique of American women. John Dray, secretary of the anthropometrical committee of the British association, does not think that, despite the English woman's fondness for athletics, there is any permanent deterioration in the beauty of the feminine form observable on this side.

"Although," he says, "the present fashion of women indulging in athletics has influenced the modern woman's figure, broadening her shoulders and waist, perhaps, and enlarging her hands and feet, such changes are almost as temporary as the fashion which causes them. An athletic woman may carry the physical signs of her muscular prowess to the end of her life, but the physique and form of her children will not be influenced in the least."

The son of the brawny armed blacksmith, as is well known, does not inherit the huge muscles of his father. In the daughter of a broad, flat shouldered and heavy handed athletic woman of today will revert to the small hands and the narrow bottle shoulders of the young woman of the early Victorian period if she is brought up on early Victorian non-athletic lines."

Mr. Gray admits that the English woman of the present day is about an inch taller than the woman of a generation ago, and also that her waist is somewhat larger and her shoulders flatter.

Rumor says that Queen Mary is going to have a black carpet in her boudoir in Buckingham Palace and the rumor is true black drawing rooms will speedily become the fashion in London. Some 15 years ago there was black carpets and smart people filled up rouge-et-noir salons in their houses but the fashion quickly died out.

It was found that black as a background for certain varieties of furniture or pictures only appealed to certain tastes. Although gilt furniture goes very well with a black carpet, it is next to impossible to have any light or delicate colors in the room where the floor is dead black, and the effect in a small house is apt to be depressing, especially in London, besides, a black carpet wears very badly, the slightest speck of dust or footmarks shows. It is a carpet to look at, not to walk on."

Japanese competition is making serious inroads upon British industries, handicapped as they are by free trade. While British trade is booming, according to the free trade importers, Japanese cheap labor is displacing English produce in the hardware, cotton goods and dress making trades.

London West End shops today offer French costumes made on the latest Paris models and exquisitely tailored, but made in Japan at one-fourth the cost for labor that would be paid the English dressmakers. At other shops can be bought dinner and tea services modeled in Japan on the best English Doulton and Minton designs and perfectly turned out at one-third the price of the genuine English goods, and it is the same with cotton materials.

POISON EXPERT FINDS BRIDE

Washington, D. C., Dec. 17.—The hosts of upright, germ fearing assimulators of pure food, who have been predicting that Dr. Harvey W. Wiley would always keep about three laps ahead of retribution, lost all bets when the veteran coach of the "poison squad" threw aside his benzoate of soda long enough to announce that his bachelor days are nearly at an end. His engagement to Miss Anna G. Kelton, president of the Staunton Equal Suffrage Club, was formally announced, and it was made known that the expert of the Agricultural Department will set up a little establishment of his own where he can argue out the phosphate and benzoate problems with the butcher, baker and milkman.

Dr. Wiley for several years has been assisting by the absent treatment housewives and domestic purchasing agents to get only the Simon brand of purity in their meats and groceries. He has done it by sitting aloft in his laboratory, teaching his "poison squad" to enjoy cyanide and his by-products, and occasionally notifying the coroner. He never has had to scale the fire escape at four o'clock in the morning and sniff the milk to see if the formaldehyde is pure, he never has had to see that the beefsteak dates from the present administration.

With Dr. Wiley the high cost of living depended on how often he could get out of the restaurant without tipping the waiter, but now he intends to go shares with the groceryman and instalment collector. The "poison squad" and other victims of the time when he was "trying it on the dog" are making great progress in the concealment of their sorrow.

Miss Kelton is a daughter of the late Adjutant General Kelton and lives with her mother at No. 1314 R street, N. W. She is employed as a clerk in the Library of Congress, but occasionally finds time to make a few speeches in the cause of "votes for women." Dr. Wiley cares more for the cause than he does for strychnine and it was while publicly urging equal suffrage that he met Miss Kelton.
