## THE FISH MARKET

Scotch Cured Herring and

American and Upper Can-

adian Fish will Arrive Next

Week—Today's Prices.

Scotch cured herring, sold this

season for the first time in St. John,

is gradually meeting with a growing

demand among the retail buyers of the

city. These, together with the impor-

tation next week of American and

upper Canadian fish, are expected to

occupy the attention of the epicureans

of the city. The Scotch herring, the

American imports will include bluefish,

butterfish, and weakfish. The upper

Canadian wares will be dory, whitefish,

lake trout and pike.

As regards the supply usually fur-

nished for the retail market, the var-

ieties for this time is limited. The retail

prices prevailing are as follows: Red-

head 6c. lb., cod 6c. lb., halibut 7c. lb.,

smelt, 12c. doz., dory herring 24c. doz.,

kippered herring 24c. doz., blonkers 24c.

doz., haddock 15c. lb., kippered 15c.

lb., Digby chickens, 15c. box,

oysters 75c. pt. clams 20c. qt., or 30c.

## THE AUTO SHOW

Exhibition Proves Successful

Arrangements May be Made

for Annual Show.

Active plans are being made by the

promoters for the St. John Automobile

exhibition to be held in the city

February 8th to 15th, and if present

plans materialize and the success of

the innovation warrants, the show

will be held, has already been re-

served and both local and outside

dealers are manifesting considerable

interest in the project.

T. C. Kirby, of Montreal, who will

be assistant manager of the show, is

now in the city, and stated last even-

ing that some 150 to 200 cars would

probably be exhibited, ranging in

price from the most luxurious and

modern automobile costing in the

vicinity of \$5,000 to the cheap

models of lower priced cars. Ex-

hibitors from all sections of the

provinces have applied for space, and

cars from Halifax and Amherst have

also been entered, as well as some

from Upper Canadian centres. An

interesting feature of the show will

be an exhibit of six cars from the Mar-

time Motor Company, in which the

product of the new Goldwyn model

will be shown. The McKay car from

Nova Scotia will also be shown.

In connection with the automobile

show it is hoped to hold a good roads

convention, a feature of special im-

portance to every motor enthusiast.

E. M. Wilcox of Toronto, organizer

of the Montreal and Toronto shows,

will be in charge of the local exhibi-

tion. The decorations and lighting

effects will be of a high order, and

concerts will be rendered twice daily

by a military orchestra.
