TEAM POLITICS MATTER WITH BROOKLYNITES

Fans who follow the fortunes of the
Brooklyn National League team are
trying to find out what has caused the
disaster this year. Messrs. Ebbetts and
McKeever, who built a \$500,000 stadium
last year, are not to blame for the
showing of the Dodgers. They con-
tracted last spring to pay more than
\$30,000 in salaries to the players. Yet
there is something lacking. Is it the
team headed by a star player who
wanted to be appointed manager when
the Brooklyn club decided to let Bill
Dahlen out? The re-engagement of
Robinson for three years is said to
have disconcerted some of the con-
spirators, who, in the opinion of certain
persons, were anxious to undermine
the rotund manager. Other members
of the team have openly flouted with
the Federal league and also have vi-
olated the rules of discipline. The
result of these things, Messrs. Ebbetts
and McKeever, in spite of their fair-
ness to the men, will be compelled to
leave a deficit at the end of the
present campaign.

There is a remedy, however. Before
another baseball season opens, the
Dodgers will receive a shakeup
which will send several important in-
dividuals to other cities. Robinson has
lost his full authority to build a team
up according to his own ideas,
and his first move will be directed
against the men who have been un-
successfully planned his downfall.

THIS DATE IN RING ANNALS

1888—Joy reigned in the sporting
world on this date, for it was
announced that John L. Sullivan
van, after having persistently
refused to fight Jake Kilrain,
had at last decided to do so,
and that a syndicate of fight-
fans had agreed to back him to
the extent of \$10,000. This
startling news was following
quickly by a cable from Paris
which stated that Jake's back-
ers had put up \$5,000 to match
their man against Sullivan for
the belt and the championship
of the world. Kilrain then held
the belt, which had been pre-
sented to him at Baltimore a
year before, after every effort
had been made to match him
with John L. Kilrain then
went to England, where he
fought 106 rounds with Jim
Smith, the English champion.
Jake had all the best of it, but
he could not stop Jim, and the
next was called a draw. After
the announcement of the Sulli-
van-Kilrain match much bicker-
ing followed, but in December
a final agreement was reached,
and in July of 1889 John L.
whipped Kilrain in 15-round
battle that was the last bare-
knuckle fight in America, and
which was pulled off at Rich-
mond, Miss.
