**NEW BRUNSWICK BOY
HAS NARROW ESCAPE
WHILE ASLEEP IN TENT**

Captain W. T. McFarlane of Newcastle Escapes Death—Shell Passes Through Tent—Explodes Short Distance Away.

In a letter to his parents at Newcastle, Capt. W. T. McFarlane writes of an interesting experience at the front. Captain McFarlane is a son of School Inspector P. G. McFarlane, of Newcastle.

The letter follows:
France, May 5, 1917.

Dear Mother:
I had an interesting experience the other night. Just after I went to bed and when Capt. Scott was going to bed I heard an enemy naval gun fire, and the shot sounded to be going over, so half awake as I was, for a second I forgot all about it, but only for a second. Believe me the shell went right through our tent and never touched either of us. It detonated about ten feet from my head. I was dazed for a few seconds. The noise of the explosion was terrific, for it was a six inch shell. I was covered with dirt, etc., which came down in jumps. You should see the crater. The shell penetrated the earth about four feet before detonating. Capt. Scott was tossed up in the air and his bed broken. When the row subsided I looked across the tent space and behold the moon was staring me in the face. The tent had been blown to bits and disappeared. Evidently the time of miracles is not over yet. But why should you worry? Some guardian angel is taking care of me.

If all goes well here's hoping we'll be home yet this year.

There was a general falling off in the matter of recruiting among all the local units yesterday. But three men were signed on. Out of five applications only one was found physically fit for the Machine Gun Draft.

It is now certain that 236th Battalion will leave on Friday morning for Valcartier. Several St. John people who have relatives and friends in the Kilties left yesterday to see the boys before their departure to the summer camping grounds.

Twenty-six recruits who enlisted in Boston within the last few days will arrive in Fredericton today to commence training.

It is reported that a draft from the Forestry unit will soon leave for overseas. The remainder of the unit will likely proceed to Valcartier to complete their training. Men enlisting in the province for the unit after its departure will be sent to the headquarters of the unit.

The end of the present week will in all probabilities see the end of the 62nd Canadian Defence Regiment. Lieut.-Col. J. L. McAvity is now busily engaged in making out the reports and records of the defence unit, which will be forwarded to the authorities.
