been discharged for misconduct, sometimes for less than major offences. It is to stop such miscarriages of justice that I introduce a bill that I hope some day will receive approval from all sides of the House.

Motion agreed to, bill read the first time and ordered to be printed.

This gives the number of inmates incarcerated throughout each year for each particular offence. It should be noted that the figures cannot be added either horizontally or vertically. Horizontally because an inmate convicted of a specified offence could remain at the same institution for each year, therefore, giving the impression that there were five inmates convicted of the offence when in reality there was only one and vertically because some inmates may have been convicted of more than one crime.
