



The fur traders flocked around the fort, snatching every opportunity for trade and thus, within a stone's throw of Fort Garry, was begun the foundation of the city of Winnipeg. The lake sixty miles to the north had long since been named "Winnipeg," a contraction of the Cree Indian "Ouinipfque" or "Winnipie," meaning "Wim"—murky, and "Nipi"—water, so the name was adopted for the new metropolis

Across the river was the old Catholic settlement of St. Boniface and one ranges up and down the corridors of time and history waiking its streets, overshaded by great, old trees, gazing in the mellowed cathedral and buildings, with the imprint of time on them. It was as early as 1817 that a band of French soldiers made their headquarters at Point Douglas and established St. Boniface.

There are now over 500 miles of streets in Winnipeg and many of the names are rich in historic of the young Canadians who fell in the Riel rebellion.
