PIONEER OF LONDON DIED THIS MORNING

Philip Cook Well Known to Many Londoners.

BORN IN IRELAND

Was Father of the Shoe Business in This City.

One of the pioneer businessmen of London passed away this morning in the person of Philip Cook, 379 Queen's Avenue, who had reached his 92nd year. Mr. Cook was born in Knockbride, County Cavan, Ireland, on May 18, 1839, both his parents being natives of the well-known O'Reilly family of that county. Mr. Cook emigrated to America with his family and landed at New York City on Easter Sunday, 1855, and lived there for some years.

Mr. Cook's father and his brother-in-law, Mr. Joseph Peacock, who had married Mr. Cook's only sister, hearing that there was a demand for shoes among the men engaged in the construction of the Welland Canal, removed to the Niagara district, and here Mr. Cook went to school. He was very fond of recalling those school days. His teacher was a Scotchman named McLeod, who was a stern disciplinarian. Mr. Cook was an officer in the Napoleonic wars, but who got mixed up in the Macdonald rebellion in Canada in 1837. He had to flee for refuge to the United States, thereby saving his life. Mr. Cook returned to Canada when a general amnesty was granted. From this man Mr. Cook inherited a familiarity with the early political history of Canada.

On February 4, 1861, he married Mary O'Brien, and three years later he established the shoe store at the J. T. Cook Company, and soon became prominently identified with the welfare and growth of the city. Those early years were replete with interesting experiences. For example, Mr. Cook witnessed the arrival of the first train in London, run on the Great Western Railway, and on one occasion, with some companions, he participated in a bear hunt on Dundas street. He was a veritable encyclopedia of information regarding the establishment and progress of the city, and on the families identified with its early history, and up to the last was in possession of all his faculties, including an exceptionally keen memory.

As John had been on parole before he was fined \$10 and costs with the option of enjoying the privilege of working in the city through the bars at Castle-on-Thames within the next ten days.

Mr. Cook retired some years ago, and his business was continued by his sons, of whom J. T. Cook, who died a few years since, founded the Cook-Fitzgerald Shoe Company. The business was carried on by Philip Cook, Jun., who is survived by two sons, Philip Cook, Jun., and Edward, and four daughters, Mrs. C. J. Fitzgerald of Riverside, Connecticut; Mrs. H. Dignan, and Mrs. William McPhillips of this city, and Miss Ella Cook at home.

The funeral will take place from St. Peter's Cathedral on Wednesday morning at 9 o'clock, when regular mass will be sung by his grandson, Rev. Father R. H. Dignan of St. Mary's Church.

MINISTERIAL ALLIANCE APPROVES PROHIBITION

Resolution Advises That Ballot on April 18, Be Made "Yes."

A short meeting of the London Ministerial Alliance was held in the Y. M. C. A. this morning, when a resolution was passed on the necessity of total prohibition was held.

The following resolution was moved by Rev. R. G. Peever and seconded by Rev. C. H. Schmitt: "That the London Ministerial Alliance here assembled place on record, in view of the coming referendum on April 18, that: First, We believe in the O. T. A. of 1919 as the best means of interests of this province in the matter of temperance; second, that while we are conscious of the defects of the working of this act, nevertheless we believe in the absolute necessity of preventing the weakening of this act in any way and we would call upon all people to vote 'yes' on April 18, thereby bringing into effect the will of the people."

Eight Civil Actions, Six Non-Jury and Two Jury, Listed.

With only one criminal case on the docket, the spring assizes court opened at the courthouse at 2 o'clock this afternoon. The case is that of the King against Sylvia Sansone. The defendant, who is but 16 years old, is charged with attempting to break into Ward's cigar factory on King street, and with assaulting and attempting to rob Jacob Wolfe, an east end businessman.

Eight civil actions are listed, six of them are non-jury and two jury cases. Of the latter, one was entered by John. J. Justice Kelly.

It is expected that the court will not last longer than Thursday and that the jury's work will be concluded by Wednesday morning.
