The children are to be congratulated upon the splendid manner in which they rendered the different numbers.

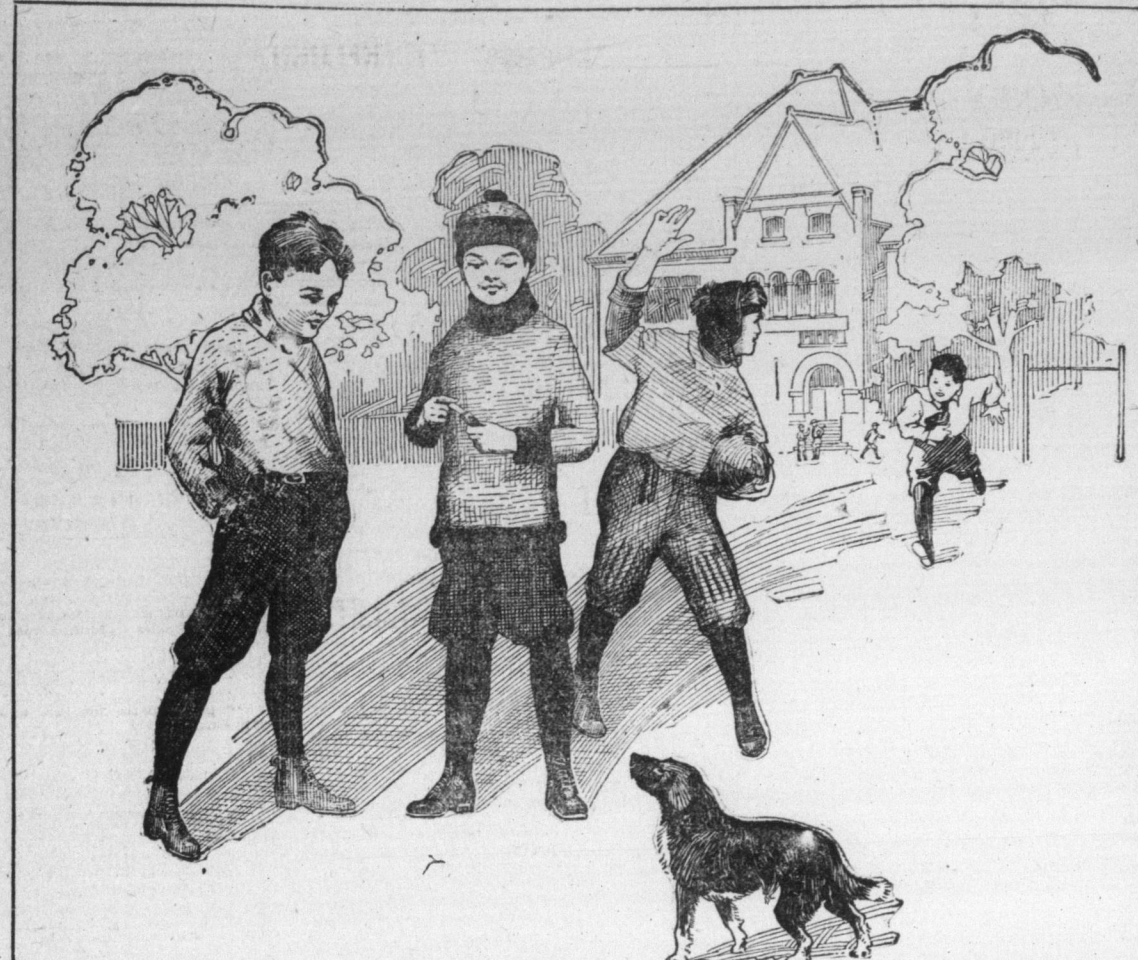

DRURY GOVERNMENT WILL ASK OTTAWA TO TAKE OVER T. N. O. RY.

CORALIT, Dec. 8.—Speaking to the T. & N.O. Associated Boards of Trade here this afternoon, Premier Drury, replying to the various resolutions presented, said the needs of the North had impressed themselves upon him very fully in his trip through the country. Once more he refused to make promises, but said he hoped that before long the country would develop and also that the Dominion Government would be asked to take over the Temiskaming & Northern Ontario itself and colonization would flow in.

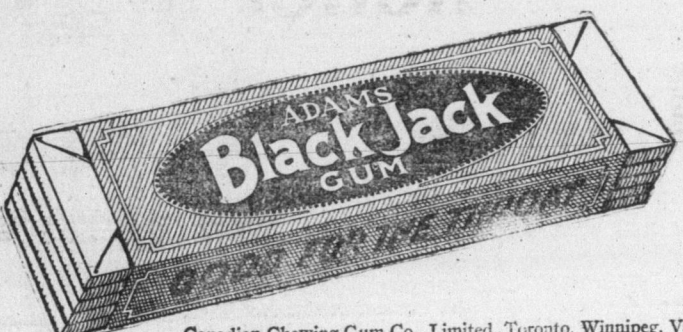

SYNOPSIS OF QUESTION TO BE SUBMITTED TO THE ELECTORS UNDER A CERTAIN BY-LAW.

On the First day of December, A.D. 1919, a By-Law was passed by the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the City of Kitchener to submit to the vote of the electors the question: Are you in favor of the passing of a By-Law to abolish the Water Commission?
