HUGHES, PATRICK, J.P. (*Niagara.*)

S. of the late Bernard Hughes, Esq., Newry, Co. Down, Irel., who died in Toronto 24 June 1848, by his wife Anne Fegan, who died in Toronto 24 April 1877. Is descended from the Hughes family of the Co. Monaghan, Irel. on the paternal side, and of the Fegans of Barmeen, Irel. on the maternal side. B. in Newry on the 26 March 1831. Ed. there until he left Irel., 24 April 1847, to come with his family to Canada, and arrived in Toronto July 14 same year, where he has since resided and founded the large Mercantile House of Hughes Brothers, of which he is the senior member, his brother, Mr. Barnard Hughes, being his only partner. M. in Boston, U.S. 14 Dec. 1858, Mary Eliza, dau. of Patrick Donohoe, Esq., of the *Boston Pilot*. She d. 24 January 1873. M. 2nd, 18 May 1876, Margaret Louis, dau. of John Sheridan, Esq., of Rochester, U.S. Director of the Imperial Bank, Toronto; dir. of the Bristol and West of England Loan and Investment Coy.; dir. of the Toronto Savings Bank. Was elected Ald. in St. George's Ward, Toronto, 1877, by a large majority. Re-elected in 1878 by a large majority. First returned to Parlt. at last g.e.—A Liberal, and was elected in the interests of the Reform Party.—*Toronto, Ont.*

HUNTINGTON, Hon. LUCIUS SETH, Q.C. (*Shefford.*) 2ND MEM.

The descendant of a New Eng. family that came to New Eng. at the time of the *Mayflower*, and participated in all the vicissitudes of that time.
