1878, p. 56); goes to the Standing Committe on Standing Orders, in accordance with the 53rd Rule, and is reported. (Coms. J., 1878, p. 61.) As soon as the Bill is received from the Senate, with the evidence and docu ments, motion is made for its 1st reading. It is carried on a division, and the names are taken, (Ibid. 160-1.) The 2nd reading is opposed like the first, and the names are also taken, (Ibid, 167-8.) The Rules 49 and 60 are generally suspended, and the Bill is referred to the Standing Committee on Miscellaneous Private Bills (Ibid.) It is reported; referred to a Committee of the Whole, reported without amendment,* and read 3rd time on a division, and the names are taken, (Ibid.) It is passed on a division (Ibid, 185-6.) The Bill is returned to the Senate, with the documents communicated by that House.

132. When presented for His Excellency's assent, the bill is reserved for the signification of Her Majesty's pleasure. (Ibid, p. 297.) The Queen's pleasure must be signified within two years by the Governor General, or the Bill becomes effete. (B. N. A. Act, 1867, sec. 57.)
