## AT a General Court Martial held at Halifax, Nora Scotia, on the 10 hth

 Junc, 1822, and continued by adjournments to the 26th of the same Month, Deputy Assistant Commissary General Charles Blackadar, was arraigned upon the undermentioned Charges, viz.1st "For neglect of Duty, in haviug failed to exhibit before a Beard of OExces,
" assembled by Order of His Excellency the Lieutenant General Cosmmendiog,
" between the 11th and 16th of May, 1822, the Sum of Tzo Thomand Pounds,
"Halifax Currency, or thereabouts, belonging to the Public, winch somed part of
"a balance with which he was chargeable on the 16 th Mar, 1523
2d "For having emoezzled or fraudulently misapplied, or cavisg wiffoliy per-
" mitted some other Person or Persons to embezzle, or frandeleany misappls,
" the Sum of ( $£_{2}, 000$ ) Two Thousand Pounds, Halifaz Curenct, or tiveréinats,
" belonging to the Public, which formed part of a baiance, with = sien ite was
" chargeable on the 16th iIIay, 1522.

Upon which Charges the Court came to the following decision:
". The Court having maturely weighed and considered the whole of the " matter which has appeared in Evidence before it, as well for the Prosecution " as the Defence, came to the following decision, viz."
" That with respect to the First Charge, the Prisoner is Gualty thereof."
"With respect to the Sccond Charge the Court acquatz the Prisoner " thereof, for the want of sufficient Evidence."
" Having found the Prisoner Guilty of the First Charge, The Cont doth " sentence and adjudge the Prisoner, Charles Biachadar, Esg. Depaty "Assistant Commissary General, to be dismissed His Majesty's Serrice, and " to make good the loss or deficiency of ( $£ 2,000$ ) Two Thousand Poudd, "Halifax Currency, to be recovered and levied after the manner pointed " out in the Mutiny Act."

His Majesty was pleased to command, that the Proceedings should be revised by the Court, for the following reasons. viz.

That the Finding and Sentence of the Court in this Case appear to be inconsistent and irreconcilable with each other.
