## Suspect faces 17 charges

Murder suspect Donald Eric Armstrong, 25, attended by two Peel police officers and handcuffed behind the back, was led into county courtroom number two on Highway 10 Friday

Dressed in a checked shirt, faded blue jeans and blue suede track shoes, the brown-haired, auburnbearded young man walked to the prisoner's box

The Halifax native faces 17 charges including two murder charges and one for attempted

Armstrong is charged with second-degree murder in connection with the stabbing death of 27-yearold Glenna Fox at the Bramalea City Centre parking lot in 1977.

He is also charged with first degree murder in the death of 16year-old Linda Bright. Her body was found 40 kilometres away from the Kingston shopping mall where she was last seen in March, 1978.

Armstrong is also charged with attempted murder in the stabbing of

Rita Bayer, 41, at Square One shopping centre in 1977. He is also wanted on a Canada-wide warrant in the forcible confinement of a woman in a Winnipeg parking lot in 1977.

Armstrong's current home is the Metro West Detention Centre in Etobicoke where he was taken after being arrested on his way out of the Brampton Detention Centre, March 28 by Peel Police Inspector Jim
