The building was artistically draped with festoons of bunting interspersed with flags.

But what added life and charm to the pleasing picture was the arrangement of the children in their pretty white dresses made a pleasing contrast to the border of boys in dark suits.

Encircling the whole was a triple border of large bunting flags. The carriages drove up to the strains of the National Anthem sung by the pupils, accompanied by the Regimental Band. The party were welcomed by Miss Abram on a crimson platform. As Lord and Lady Minto returned the greeting line the Miss Margaret Stringer, niece of Geo. Stephens, M. P., presented Lady Minto with a beautiful bouquet of pink roses.

Miss Stringer said: "Dear Lord and Lady Minto, we, the children of McKeough school, are proud to welcome you here to-day. It is a great pleasure to us to see the representative of our great and noble King, and we shall never forget your kindness in honoring us with this visit. Please accept these flowers from the girls and boys you have made so happy to-day."

Lady Minto bowed her acknowledgments. Lord Minto then rose and thanked the boys and girls for their welcome. Continuing he said, "It gives me great pleasure to be with you to-day, and that the courtesies may not be all received by me, we are going to request the Chairman of the Public School Board to give you a holiday on Friday."

After the singing of "Gallant Sons of Canada," the school gave three rousing cheers for Lord and Lady Minto as the party drove off. Three hearty cheers followed for Mayor McKeough and three for McKeough school.

URSULINE ACADEMY

Nowhere were the vice-regal representatives accorded a more delightful greeting than that which awaited them from the patriotic Ursuline Academy. The reception at "The Pines" was an exceedingly charming and graceful ceremony and did much to add to the pleasant memories of the Maple City visit which all Chathamites hope may be retained by their excellencies.

As the vice-regal party entered the gates of the Academy they were met by Misses Muriel Massey, Margaret Bell and Blanche Kelly, who presented the visiting ladies with beautiful floral bouquets. Upon driving under the large canopy provided the distinguished visitors were greeted by a splendid chorus of welcome by the pupils who were gathered in the grounds. The musical greeting had been specially arranged for the occasion and the parts carefully allotted. Miss Gaven was the soprano soloist and the semi-chorus who contributed the charming mezzo-voice echoes of the full chorus was composed of Misses Trankla, Murphy, Brennie, James, Sperman and Carson. The accompaniments were played throughout on magnificent Newcombe pianos kindly loaned by Mr. Tschir-

hart, by Misses Mabelle Edmondson and Anna Carson.

Following the musical greeting, Miss Edith Hall, daughter of Dr. Wm. R. Hall, presented a souvenir address of welcome to Lady Minto. This was a magnificent piece of delicate artistic workmanship, a marvelous tribute to the talent and accomplishment of the ladies of St. Ursula.

A description of it is reprinted from yesterday's Planet.

The address is beautifully bound in white satin, exquisitely laced with silver cord. The upper corners of the left of the cover is delicately woven with blue and white satin, the colors of the Academy. Below is a rich cluster of hand-painted Heart's-ease, dainty in chaste coloring and

with marvellously executed shading effects.

The dedication page is a veritable artistic gem. Guardian of its insignias hovers a hand-painted angel holding forth the royal coat of arms in gold. Below is the crest of the Dominion perfectly executed, upon which rests a cornucopia containing the emblematic rose, thistle and shamrock. The Canadian flag is entwined with the Royal Standard and the whole rests on an embankment of Maple branches, the leaves in their rich autumn coloring. The golden scroll "The True Patriot is Fame's Greatest Boast," completes an alluringly aesthetic dedication page.

The title page is painted and lettered upon old parchment, framed in rich modern bordering. It is designed to illustrate the inscription "The work of the monks and hermits of medieval times and is lettered in the old missal illumination, giving an exceedingly unique and artistic effect. The address follows, beautifully painted, page by page, on parchment, and concludes with a very delicately wrought representation of the seal of the Academy.

The entire address, designing and binding, is the work of the Religious of "The Pines" and is a wonderful tribute to their taste and skill.

Following the gift of this address, the Lady Superior and Religious were presented to their excellencies.

"How beautifully they sing!" was the comment of Lady Minto when the chorus had concluded, and really the compliment was deserved.

After the address had been made Lord Minto made a brief reply. He said—

"I cannot tell you how deeply I appreciate the hearty welcome you have given us to-day to The Pines. Our time here is so short that we find it impossible to go inside the Academy, but the ceremony outside is the prettiest I have ever seen. I congratulate you on your success as singers and entertainers. I have seen many convent ceremonies and I can safely say that I never saw a prettier one than the one you have

given us to-day. I can assure you that Lady Minto and myself appreciate the kind words you have given us, and I would ask the Mother Superior a holiday in honor of our visit."

His speech was greeted with expressions of thanks and applause from the assembled students. Miss Gaven, Miss Hall and others of the scholars were then introduced to their Excellencies. As the party drove away the school sang in chorus God Save the King. As the distinguished visitors drove away the whole gathering sang the National anthem.

SEPARATE SCHOOL

One of the most pleasant parts of the procession was the visit to the Separate School.

The sisters had made splendid preparations for the vice-regal visit to their school and the result was most pleasing. The building was very tastefully decorated with national colors and flags. The pupils were all gathered at the front of the school and presented a very pretty appearance. Every little girl was dressed in white.

Just as the vice-regal party approached the school the pupils commenced to wave their flags. As the carriages with the Governor General stopped all made a graceful courtesy. Immediately followed a welcome chorus was sung by the children.

Flowers were presented to their excellencies by Misses Mary McDonald and Winnie Downey and Master Clinton Deloge and Irwin Thibodeau. Both little girls were dressed entirely in white and the presentation of the gift was indeed a pretty sight.

His Excellency, Lord Minto, then spoke a few words of congratulation and thanks to the scholars of the school, after which the scholars sang God Save The King as the party withdrew.

A HOLIDAY.

In addressing the pupils of the various schools his Excellency asked for all the students a whole holiday on Friday in honor of his visit.

RAILROAD ROASTED.

A warm bunch of criticism was handed out to the railroad, by reason of the arrangements made for the reception.

Just before the arrival of the vice-regal special a long cattle-train pulled in and remained at the depot throughout the entire proceedings. This train was carrying cows and hogs and the odor at times was most unpleasant.

Both the citizens and members of the visiting party commented most strongly on this conduct by the railroad and many severe condemnations were passed upon it.

SCORED THE POLICE.

The vice-regal press representative who travels with the special gave a short interview.

"Chatham is just a lovely little city," he said to The Planet, "one of the most picturesque that their Excellencies have yet visited in the Western trip. Your Mayor and citizens are to be complimented on the excellent reception accorded."

"I must tell you this, however," he added, "that your police are open to much criticism. The police control was the most disgraceful yet seen in the vice-regal tour. There were apparently no attempt to handle the crowd at the depot. One unfortunate crazy woman created a scene at the reception but there was no policeman about."

BAND COMPLIMENTED.

Captain Graham, A. D. C., had some complimentary things to say of Bandmaster H. C. Philp and the Regimental Band, whose playing, he said, "was capital."

Captain Graham also spoke highly of the Regimental guard of honor under Captain Fred Stone. "A splendid body of soldiers," he said. "Their present was executed like veterans."

THE DEPARTURE

Leaving the Separate school, procession was made to the Grand Trunk station via Queen street, Park street and William.

As the carriage approached the depot the Regiment, under Captain Stone, gave a royal salute, the band playing the National Anthem. When the train was about to pull out, hats were doffed and three hearty cheers and a tiger were rendered in right royal style for Lord and Lady Minto, the vice-regal party leaving the city for Windsor and Detroit at 2:43 p.m.
