The frog proceeds from an egg in the form of aroundish black or brown substance; hav-ing a tail. In ninety seven days it exhibits, eyes; and in two days more arms --the tail drops; and the animal becomes a perfect frog. Toads are formed in similar manner. The frog fish of Surinam even returns to its origi-nal state. It is first a fish : then a frog : and, after many years, it reverts again to the shape and condition of a fish.


