

WANTS AMENDMENT MAKING

Would Place Expense of Administering the Law on Insurance Carriers and Fund.—Appropriation of \$700,000 Unnecessary.

Chairman Robert E. Dowling, of the Workmen's Com-pensation Commission, has advocated amendments to eleven o'clock a.m. Asken the law making the cost of operating the State Insurance Fund a charge on the fund itself and placing

the cost of maintaining the commission would made a charge on the insurance carriers in 1918, rehade a charge on the insurance carriers in 1210, re-leving the State of the necessity of paying this ex-pense. The cost of running the State fund now is \$225,000 a year, and the rest of the \$760,000 would be d in running the commission itself

Chairman Dowling maintained that the commission has been run efficiently.

Senator Henry M. Sage, of the Senate Finance Committee, promised Chairman Dowling and the others connected with the compensation commission who appeared at the joint hearing to ask for appropria tions to carry the commission along, that funds would be appropriated "immediately to dissipate the appreon as to the stability of the State Insurance

With its funds exhausted the commission is crippled, its work being carried on at present only because its employes volunteered to stay on their jobs until money was available to pay them. Pending determination by the Republican administration of a plan to reorganize the commission, Chairman Dowling asked that an appropriation of \$60,000 a month be made to run the commission. The Senate Finance Committee and the Assembly Ways and Means Committee thought this too much, so the Compensation ommission appeared to show why this amount was

Amendments designed to place the comm self-supporting basis after January 1, 1916, have been prepared by the commission for early introduction in he Legislature.

The first amendment would provide that the State Fund be maintained entirely iums and that it receive no State aid after July 1, 1915. By the second it is proposed to pay the administration expenses after the first of next year from assessments levied on insurance companies, the State fund and those corporations or individuals who insure themselves.
