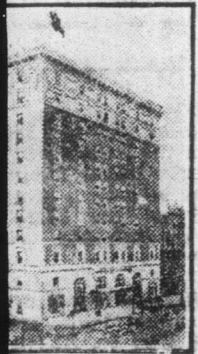

LEAGUE PRESIDENT UPHOLDS DECISION

When a Runner Collides With Umpire He Can Return to His Base.

Chicago, June 9.—President B. B. Johnson of the American League has sustained a decision of Umpire Chilli in the Boston-Cleveland game last Saturday, which it was said to-day established a precedent for plays in which an umpire interferes with a base runner. The decision of Chilli, against which Boston protested, was that the runner return to his base. So far as known, no similar case has occurred in major league baseball and is not covered by the rules.

Turner, after making a hit rounded first base and collided with Chilli twice. He then stopped and walked to second base, where he was touched by the Boston second baseman. He was called out at first by the umpire, but after a conference with Umpire Dincen, the decision was reversed and Turner was allowed to return to first base.

The decision has received the sanction of President Johnson and Boston's protest was disallowed.
