Subway and elevated trains ran last night and this morning as us-ual, the travelling public having returned to its accustomed routes by subway and elevated.

A number of elevated trains were attacked during the early morning, but in no case was there any approach to a mob riot. Strike sympathizers on the roofs of tenement houses bombarded trains with bottles and bricks, and in one instance with pistol shots. None of the bullets took effect, but several passengers were cut missiles and broken glass. Rumore a plot to blow up the subway caused the police to maintain a watch at every underground station, but the subway trains ran during the night and

early morning without molestation. The strike thus far, according to Mr. Waddell, has cost the traction companies \$300,000.
