

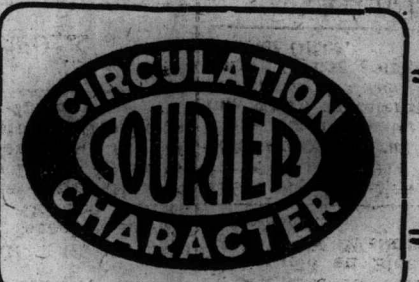

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OPENINGS MADE FOR GRADE A MEN

Grades B and C Cannot Join Any Branch of the Service ARE NOT VOLUNTEERS

10,186 Grade A Men Have Been Found in This Military District

If further evidence was required that only Grade A men are to be drafted for the raising of Canada's army of 100,000 it was furnished yesterday when the order went out through military headquarters, on its brooch, Ottawa, that no men in Class One other than those whose medical examination places them in category A, will be accepted as recruits on the volunteer basis. In other words, this means that there is absolutely nothing which B and C men can do in the way of recruiting, and even if they do volunteer their services for overseas non-combatant units or home service they will not be accepted. There is also a period set aside during which Grade A men may volunteer for other overseas units and so avoid the draft. All men of this medical standing being permitted to join any overseas service up to December 10, the date on which the first draft is to be called to the colors. These services include the infantry, Army Service Corps, Canadian Engineers, cavalry units and the artillery, though at present there is no call for artillerymen, and every indication is that there will not be any demand for several months in English establishments. The process for Grade "A" men to be changed, after their medical test, they must go to the post office and report for service, getting in return a certificate from the recruiting officer, which they take to the Registrar, who issues a certificate from their employer, certifying that no claim for exemption will be made on their behalf, if they wish to join, and they will be offered an at-once. The commanding men are in service. In such cases, a relative can be considered, so the man wishing to join up at once should have a thorough understanding of his relations that they do not on his behalf. In an exemption appeal regulations, reinforcements for non-combatant services overseas, such as the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, must be drawn from men single men from 18 to 20, or from 24 to 45, or from married men.

The list of men reporting at the post-offices is gradually increasing, the total up to last night for this military district being 13,226, with nearly 80,000 to be heard from. The percentage, there being 11,336 willing to serve, compared with 11,891 who have claimed exemption. Even yet there is no appreciable rush at any of the city recruiting offices, though during the noon and evening hours the report forms, which many men touch are to be seen at the post-offices, and many are the papers given to the clerks for not wishing to serve. Everything reported are getting to have a hard time of it. Making their decisions, while it seems they will have to steel their hearts to all service, if an undue number of men is not to be exempted. Along this line was a case yesterday where a young lady asked for an exemption application on which she wished to write the name of her particular friend, and she was quite frank in stating her reasons for doing so. In her life she had had only one particular friend, and she didn't want him taken from her, for in case he never came back, she, in the meantime, would have arrived at an age which would make it particularly difficult to find another. It would be much feater, she maintained, to make the younger girls give up their boy friends.

Reports From Girls

Reports just in from all the medical boards in this district show that 21,645 men have been examined under the new system, out of which number 10,186 have been declared fit for any form of service. As the percentage of Grade A men at the local depot hardly shows as high a proportion as that it would indicate that the outside boards are possibly a little more lenient in their examinations.

AUSTRALIAN STATE ELECTION.

SOUTH BRANT WOMEN'S INSTITUTE

Semi-Annual Meeting Held And Splendid Report Is Given

The semi-annual business meeting of South Brant Women's Institute was held on Thursday, October 18th, at the lovely home of Mrs. A. D. Muir, Burford, Mrs. J. E. Brethour, District President presided. The minutes and report of work accomplished by the District Executive, was given by Miss Ruelofson, District Secretary, and reports were given from all branch secretaries, of Red Cross and other work, which had been done since the annual meeting in June. These reports were most encouraging, the amount of work done and money raised throughout the district being almost past credence. All the money which was well into the thousands, was devoted to Red Cross and Belgian relief with the exception of small amounts to school fairs, and \$25 to Brantford Hospital for the upkeep of S.B.W.I. Ward. Besides the cash raised, hundreds of pairs of socks have been knitted and many Christmas boxes packed and sent to the boys at the front. Oak Hill branch is furnishing a room in the Veterans' Home, Brantford. Many ideas of ways and means of raising money were exchanged.

The following letter was read, which speaks for itself. The bed referred to was paid for with the money raised from the sale of the books kindly donated to the district by Mrs. J. E. Brown, of Brantford. After hearing the letter it was unanimously decided to raise another hundred dollars to maintain the bed for another year.

To the President of S.B.W.I.:
Dear Madam,—Pardon the liberty I am taking in writing you, however, under the circumstances I am sure you will allow the privilege. I would like to tell you, and your sister workers just how I felt when I came to this hospital after several months in English establishments, and was given a bed donated by the ladies of the Institute of South Brant. The difficulty is, however, that I cannot express the feelings. You see I am from Norfolk myself and claim, at least, a few friends in your county. I assure you, madam, it was a "break-up" home, and I thank you, and your society for myself, and I am sure countless others for your gift to Red Cross, and please believe me, it is just those little touches of the "homeland" that makes the days either bright or being present for the absence of those dear ones.

At the convention last June a Red Cross committee was formed. Mrs. A. De Muir being convener, and a Hospital Aid Committee, with Mrs. J. E. Brethour as convener, two representatives from each branch, the object being to bring all the branches in close touch in their work. These committees each held a short session and new work and ways of raising money were decided on. Mrs. Muir read the following little article on the importance of letters to our soldier. "That Neighbor of Ours." And what a big part it is we are all called upon to do. We thought last year we were doing all that could possibly be done by women, with only one pair of hands each, and perhaps we were, but this coming year we simply must do more, so we will each just have to get another pair of hands, and we are all aware of where to find them. There is your neighbor on the next farm, who isn't a member yet, or that woman just across the street, who puts all the fancy work on her own and her children's clothes. They cannot be started. So let us each take a day off—oh, no, not a day off Red Cross work, but a day off visiting or entertaining visitors, or shopping, or going on a little trip. Let us take a day from these employments and so and get that neutral neighbor of ours and set her to work. We ought to do it even for her own sake. Tell her that her King and her country need her NOW, and tell her if she does not respond to the call there will surely be a soldier laid in the trenches unrequited for just because she did not do her bit.

Greater Than Guns.

What do you suppose Lieut. Alken, late of somewhere in France, says is the most important thing in the trenches? No, not guns, nor ammunition, nor bayonets, nor even food. It's socks! Just plain common grey socks we women are knitting. The war simply could not go on without them. Every man with poor socks is a casualty, said the killed lad with a lame leg and a crutch, and he has been there too long to know the value of a pair of socks. So sell that woman on the next farm who doesn't belong to your branch, and the woman across the street, with all the crocheting, that they are helping the Kaiser win the war for the soldiers would all be barefoot if Canadian women were all like them.

RETURNED DECORATIONS.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN HOME WEST LAND REGULATIONS

The sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, who was at the commencement of the present war, and has since continued to be a British subject or a subject of an allied or neutral country, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion Land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for District. Entry by proxy may be made on certain conditions. Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of land in each of three years. In certain districts a homesteader may secure an adjoining quarter-section as pre-emption. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Six months in each of three years after securing homestead patent and cultivate 50 extra. May obtain pre-emption patent as soon as homestead patent on certain conditions. A settler after obtaining homestead patent, if he cannot secure a pre-emption, may make an application for a quarter-section in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Must reside six months in each of three years after securing homestead patent and cultivate 50 extra. May obtain pre-emption patent as soon as homestead patent on certain conditions. Settlers of straggled may count time of employment as farm labourers in Canada during 1917, as residence duties under certain conditions. Settlers who have served overseas and have been honorably discharged, receive priority in applying for entry at local Agency. (Notice of Homestead Agency). Discharge papers must be presented to Agent.
