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FOREIGNERS ROUNDED UP

Those who were found to have defaulted under the registration act will appear in the police court on Wednesday.

SUPREME SACRIFICE

Mrs. Tyrrell, 9 Rose Avenue, received word on Saturday that her son, Pte. George A. Tyrrell, of Lord Strathcona's Horse, was killed in action on March 30th. Pte. Tyrrell went overseas with a C.M.B. unit. One brother is a returned soldier while the father saw service in the 215th battalion, but received his discharge from that unit and died soon after. Mr. R. Tyrrell, of the Bell Telephone company is a brother of Pte. Tyrrell.
