Canadian Casualties Exceed Enlistments by About 15,000

Ottawa, Nov. 22.—Canadian casualties since the first of June a little over 42,000, or a little over twice the total of enlistments from the time the Canadian first got into the trenches until the end of last May. In August, 3,079, in September, 9,051 and in October, 14,321. The casualties this month have been so far decidedly lighter than in September or October but will still average several score per day.

The casualties and the wastage, through rejections of men found physically unfit on the second medical examination during the past five months Total approximately 15,000 more than the total number of enlistments.

In September and October total casualties were double the total of new recruits. The figures show the need of government action to systematize and speed up recruiting.

Russian Dreadnought Sunk

Petrograd, Nov. 23, via London, Nov. 24.—Russia officially announces the loss of the dreadnought Imperatritsa Maria. A statement issued tonight reads: "The Russian dreadnought Imperatritsa Maria has been sunk by an internal explosion. Two hundred of the crew are missing."

Minister of Militia Appointed

Ottawa, Nov. 23.—Hon. A. E. Kemp, M. P., for East Toronto, minister without portfolio, in the Borden cabinet and chairman since May, 1915, of the war purchasing commission has been sworn in as minister of militia in successor to Major-General Sam Hughes. The new minister was sworn in by His Excellency, the Governor-General at Rideau Hall this afternoon.

A Large Estate

Halifax, N.S., Nov. 21.—The will of Lieut.-Gov. MacKeen bequeaths his estate, valued at \$500,000 as follows:

An amount in trust to give an annual income of \$5,000 to his wife for life and \$2,500 to his daughter. Mrs MacKeen also is left \$20,000 and each son \$50,000. The sum of \$5,000 is left to the Presbyterian church and \$500 each to the School for the Blind, Infants' Home, Industrial School, School for Deaf and Old Ladies' Home. The residue to be divided in equal shares among his children.

As he was past fifty years of age he found some difficulty, but at last he succeeded and from Nov. 1914 to Oct. 1916 he has been doing his part until sent home for three months' rest from shell shock and shrapnel wounds."

Freight Handled at New Halifax Terminals.

Halifax, Nov. 26.—The first train of freight for overseas to be landed at the Halifax new ocean terminals arrived on Saturday. The train consisted of fourteen cars from the west, which was brought to the new shed.
