RANGE IN THE MARKET.

Gives His Views on the Corn And Other Questions.

The Laurier Government Has Done Everything Possible to Injure the Farmer-Now it is the Farmer's Turn.

To The Planet.—One cannot but admire the wisdom of moral and religious organizations for their care in choosing delegates. Those delegates represent the best thought of the bodies sending them, it may be to a W. C. T. U. convention or to any conference, session or synod where the general business of a church is transacted. In any case they are supposed to be picked men and women, whose interests are identical with the interests of the great bodies in whose service they labor. The high aims of that great organization, the W. C. T. U., were carried very high by Miss Willard and Lady Somersett, who showed the world what Christian sympathy could do for those whom wrong ideals had degraded. The churches are equally cautious in appointing delegates, and if they do occasionally send a wolf in woll to represent them the bulk of their appointments are men of piety.

men of piety.

Now, if moral and religious societies think it important to carry out the highest principles of representation in organizing their work, is it not essential for an agricultural county to be represented at Ottawa by a delegate whose interests are identical with those of the neonle whom he repregate whose interests are identical with those of the people whom he repre-sents. But in politics greater care should be taken in choosing delegates than in morals or religion; because politics has to do with a country and a constituency, the boundaries of which are clearly defined. There is the real parliament, the real tariff, the real parliament, the real tariff, the real statutes, and, in the case of Canada, the real, thundering debt. These facts at least render politics more practical than religion, and in speaking of morals, which are of course inseparable in a sense from true religion, and also in a sense from politics. Nothing more clearly proves the mischief of miller representation in Kent than a marked lowering of the mischief of miller representation in Kent than a marked lowering of articles in the tariff specially raised there. Millers have been known to grind corn and sell the meal. Kent and Essex are the leading corn growing counties of Canada and the free corn of the Laurier Government is a fine sample of carelessness on the part of furners choosing a delegate whose of farmers choosing a delegate whose interests are opposed to their own. Great changes have taken place of late in the eastern counties of Ontario in supplying feed for their stock. Hay, t seems, cannot be produced in sufficient quantity to maintain the vast dairy and beef interests of those counties. Corn, then, put up in its dry state, or as ensilage, is the great substitute. Large quantities of seed are required to plant the wide areas seed-ed for ensilage. That seed must be imported from some place where corn ripeds perfectly. Kent is that place. Pain Court farmers, always quick to see a market for their products, are in the business of raising seed corn, and with us in Raleigh can't see why our interests should be slaughtered. Eastern farmers profit by this arrangement. Montreal, Halifax, Quebe: and Toronto are almost at their doors. In point of good roads one only has to drive on the gravel and stone roads of the east to be convinced that we are behind them in this respect. Allowing 50 bushels of shelled corn to

eastern consumers, who have better markets and infinitely better roads.
