KEEP UP GOOD WORK.

Evangelists Crossley and Hunter Still on the War-path for Erring Chathamites.

Their Service Last Evening was Largely Attended and Profoundly Impressive.

Park St. Church was filled to the doors last evening to hear the evangelists, Crossley and Hunter.

Mr. Hunter took as his text the 18th chapter of Luke and the 9th verse.

"These are a certain class of people which I pity, for they have not the passion to Jesus. It is a good thing to have friends, but do not trust on them. It is a good thing to have a husband and wife, but do not trust in their prayers. It is a good thing to have a mother, but do not trust in her prayers. I would not want to make my mother cry by my waywardness. I say shame on the boys who stay out late at night, there is no sleep for mother while you are out and the wrinkles on her brow are caused by you. A young man was in the habit of drinking and coming in late. One night he came in drunk and early in the morning his father went to his room with a double-barrelled gun and ordered him out of bed. The son wanted to know why, and the father told him he wanted him to take the gun and go down stairs and blow his mother's brains out. The son cried, 'Father, are you crazy? are you crazy?' But the father told him that he was killing his mother in her by inch, and he had better end it all by putting her out of misery. I say shame, shame on the boys who are killing their mothers."

Two men went up in a temple to pray. One was a Pharisee who despised everyone. He fasted twice a week and fasted as other men, adulterers, extortioners, etc. I am not speaking to any person in this audience tonight, for there are no adulterers or extortioners here, but if there were I would say—God have mercy on them, for the gates of Heaven are forever shut to them. The Pharisee said in his prayer that he was merciful to a sinner. I think it would be a good thing if they would appoint a day of fast in Chatham. The other man's prayer was, "God be merciful to a sinner." I do not want to forget this prayer.

A song sermon was then given by Rev. Mr. Crossley. His text was "For the redeemed of the Lord shall return and come to Zion with songs and everlasting joy on their heads, they shall receive joy and gladness and sorrow and sighing shall flee away."

There are a great many people in the narrow way, and there are a good many not in the narrow way. Some are very near the narrow way and some are very far from it. We have all loved ones in Zion, the city of our God, and their spirits linger near. In St. Catharines 22 years ago, at the same road—Heaven on one side and Hell on the other. The reverend gentleman closed with a loving appeal for all to take the right side of the road. A large number stayed to the after-meeting.

TELEGRAPH NEWS.

Ex-Ald. Timothy O'Connor, of Guelph, 64 dead.

The new Italian cabinet announces that its policy will be liberal reform.

E. LePage, & Co., of Montreal, have made an assignment. The liabilities are over \$225,000.

Lord Pauncefote's term as British ambassador at Washington has been indefinitely extended.

A deputation of western lumbermen is in Ottawa to ask for duty on lumber coming from the United States.

Admiral Dewey receives \$9,570 in prize money for the destruction of the Spanish fleet in Manila harbor.

It is said that a registered mail bag was rifled at Ganauque and two parcels taken. The inspector is looking after the case.

R. G. Hurlbuton, a son of Judge Hurlbuton ("Sam Slick") and one of the founders of the "Canada East" party, is dead.

Herbert C. Wedman, a patient at the Bellevue Asylum, New York, died on March 5, three days after admission, and the body bears marks of violence.

Right Rev. A. E. W. Ingram, Suffragan Bishop of Stepeny, has been appointed Bishop of London, in succession to Right Rev. Mandell Creighton, who died Jan. 14.

LIFE IN A LUMBER CAMP.

Chatham Citizen Tells of His Experiences North of the Soo.

Other Representatives From This Country There—How They Spend Their Sundays.

Harry W. Knight, of Chatham township, has returned from working in a lumber camp north of the Soo. He left Chatham in November and has since been in the employ of Frank Perry, a wealthy Michigan manufacturer whose lumber camp was on Trout Lake. The logs are sawed at Mr. Perry's mill at the Soo and the lumber is then taken into Michigan. The Soo and a large number of the lumber camps are quarantined on account of the presence of small-pox. There were four cases at the Soo. Mr. Knight says that life in a lumber camp is very rough. There were about 80 men in the camp he was employed in. There were also four buildings comprising the sleeping quarters, the dining and cooking house, the van, where is kept all the necessary supplies of provisions and tobacco, and where the foreman, the clerk and the schoolers sleep. Whiskey is not allowed in the camp under any consideration, and any of the men found with it in their possession are "fired."

The timber is chiefly pine and spruce. The spruce is cut and sold to the pulp mill at the Soo, the pine is sawed into lumber.

Sunday was spent in various ways. Some of the men occupied themselves writing home, others reading, others washing and mending and some played poker for ten cents a corner or for the tobacco.

Quite a number of men from Merin were in the camp with Mr. Knight. Amongst their number were Herbert Downing, George Ward, Percy Clark and John Hart. George Bayle, of Sombra, was the fier. The country is hilly and rocky and the snow became so deep as to stop work. The snow was five feet deep on the level. After the falling of the trees was stopped, all hands were used in skidding out the logs already cut. Altogether 20,000 logs were taken out and left lying on the ice on the lake. There is no outlet to the lake and the logs are taken by rail to the Soo when the ice breaks up. When the work of skidding out the logs was completed the camp was broken up and the men paid off, the deep snow preventing the cutting of any more timber. Mr. Laimon, an aged farmer living near the camp, said that he had measured the snow as it fell since fall, and altogether 18 feet of the beautiful had fallen.
