### **OPENING OF** NEW CHANNEL

Big Undertaking Now Completed At Sault St. Marie

Cut Through Solid Rock-A Boon To The Sailors

Sault Ste. Marie, Mich., Oct. 15.—
Water was turned into the new channel of the St. Mary's River at the
West Neebish on Sunday, marking the
completion of one of the biggest projects undertaken on the great lakes
since the building of the Poe lock.
The new channel is over two miles in
length, 9,000 feet of which is cut
through solid rock. The channel is
3,000 feet in width, with a depth at
minimum stage of water of 22 feet.
It will not be formally opened to navigation until spring. The project has
cost upwards of \$3,000,000.

It is located 18 miles below the
Boo, and lies to the west of Neebish
Island, the present channel being to
the east of the island. This old channel will hereafter be used solely for
upbound boats, the heavily-laden
downbound craft using the new waterway, which has none of the sharp
turns which are embarrassing to the
modern 600-foot freighter.

MUST HAVE OPERATION.

Minister of Justice Suffering From Deafness—Cannot Attend Session. Ottawa, Oct. 15.—A serious impairment of Hon. A. B. Aylesworth's hearing may make it impossible for the Minister of Justice to attend the next

session of Parliament. A visit to New York, or even to Vienna will be necessary before Mr. Aylesworth will be able to resume his affairs.

Before a permanent relief can be assured, however, it will be necessary for Mr. Aylesworth to undergo a more radical operation. A visit to one of the aural specialists of New York or Vienna will almost certainly be required before the Minister of Justice will be seen on the floor of the House of Commons.
