CORN CROP IS DESTROYED

Frost Does Immense Damage Throughout County Of Kent

Low Lying Districts Suffer The Most—General Outlook Is Blue

The farmers in Kent County have been badly hit with the frost, and as a result there will be many heavy losses. Corn and beans have suffered the worst, and a gentleman who took a trip over a large area of the country yesterday stated this morning that the damage done was simply beyond belief.

"I saw corn fields which were absolutely ruined," he said. "In places the frost had simply cut the tender corn as if it had been mown with a scythe. There were other spots where the entire crop had been blackened on the tops, and though there seemed some hope for such spots, the farmers were most pessimistic concerning the outlook."

"The low lying lands suffered the worst of all, and where a field was the least bit knolly the low spots were killed, while the higher places escaped somewhat more lightly. At any rate the general outlook is most blue for corn. Potatoes also suffered."

The information was obtained yesterday that in the year 1816 there was frost every month of the year. Will this year prove a repetition of that unfortunate occurrence?

CORNELIUS BROTHERS WILL ARRIVE HERE TUESDAY
