NOTICE.—As frequent complaints are made to the commissioners of streets, that in certain localities rubbish has been allowed to accumulate and remain, to the annoyance of the public, and that some parties have led their sewerage into the gutters of the Highway: Notice is hereby given that, unless these violations of the Commissioners of Streets Act be discontinued, the offending parties will be summarily dealt with. For the benefit of the uninformed we quote the following, from the R. S., fifth series: "Persons residing within the foregoing limits respectively, shall keep the gutters and streets before their houses, buildings or lands inhabited or occupied by them free from dirt, filth, and nuisances of every kind; and whenever any accumulation or nuisance shall be found in any of the streets, the person before or nearest whose house, building or land the same shall be, shall forfeit \$4, and also pay the expense of removing the same, &c., &c.—Sec. 6, chap. 50.

"The commissioners shall cause all things belonging to any building or cellar or to any ground or enclosure thereof, which may occasion any nuisance, encroachment or annoyance in any street, to be removed or altered in manner approved by them or their surveyor; &c.—Sec. 9, same chapter.

New Minas.

ACCIDENTS.—A terrible accident occurred here on the evening of Wednesday, Aug 16th. A young man named Bradford Pines, a resident of this place, was returning from the Catholic Bazaar in Kentville, about 10 o'clock at night. At the entrance to the Canada road, while going at a very high rate of speed, the horse turned suddenly, overturning the carriage, and throwing out young Pines and a friend who was with him. The latter escaped uninjured, but Pines fell head foremost, the fall rendering him insensible. Aid was summoned at once, but all efforts to bring about consciousness have thus far been unavailing. Very slight hopes are entertained of his recovery.

The morning after the accident, as young Reiden, a cousin of Pines, was riding the latter's horse to water, the horse stumbled and threw the boy over his head, trampling on him and breaking his ankle. The double accident has caused considerable excitement in this quiet village.
