At a meeting of the ratepayers of the town of Berwick, held last week, the Town Council was authorized to borrow a sum not exceeding \$6,000 for the purpose of purchasing a lot of land, erecting Town Hall and equip-ment. Authorization was also given for the borrowing of a like sum to pro-ceed for the purchase of land and erec-tion of a public school house.

The first apples in carload shipments, of the 1924 crop, were shipped from Berwick station last week by Mr. S. Chute. These included five carloads of the early Crimson Beauty variety, which Mr. Chute has an abundant crop. Three cars of this fruit were shipped on Wednesday, two being consigned to Sydney, C. B. and one to Hamilton, N. B. Two more cars went forward Saturday, one to St. John, N. B., and another for Newfoundland.—Berwick Register.

The relinquishment of the Liberal leadership in the House of Lords by Countess of Fallowdon, on account of ill health, it may be assumed, vir-tually marks the end of his active pub-lic career. Lord Gray's name will be used by his countrymen as one of the foremost statesmen of his day. His services to Britain as the great Foreign Minister who strove to main-tain peace, and when his efforts failed, conducted the war diplomacy with masterly skill entitle him to a high place in his country's esteem.

Due to favorable weather in the West there is now every prospect that the estimate of the wheat crop issued by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics, namely, 282,000,000 bushels, will be exceeded. Estimates in Winnipeg place the total at about 300,000,000 bushels, which of course will be much below the huge crop of last year, yet with-out many notable exceptions the largest in the history of the country. And it is to be remembered that the West more and more is going in for mixed farming, and the returns from other branches of agriculture will swell the total.

Chief-Constable E. W. MacDonald, D. M.C., of Halifax, son of Rev. and Mrs. J. H. MacDonald, Wolfville, has been appointed Inspector of peni-tentiaries by the Civil Service Com-mission. Colonel MacDonald was for-merly commissioner of Provincial Police in Nova Scotia and organized and directed that force during the indus-trial unrest in Cape Breton. He re-ceived a commission in September, 1914, and while in France received a distinguished service order with two bars and a military cross. He was men-tioned three times in despatches.

There has been con-siderable thieving of late and a deter-mined effort should be made to detect and punish the offenders.

Seven Rules for Making Better Coffee

KEEP YOUR COFFEE FRESH

It loses strength and aroma when exposed to the air. Keep it in a tight container.

MEASURE CAREFULLY

Measure the water as well as the Coffee. Use plenty of Coffee—at least two ounces to a quart of water. Guessing usually means a poor cup of Coffee.

USE GROUNDS ONLY ONCE

Don't waste fresh Coffee by adding it to old grounds. Used Coffee grounds are of no more value in making Coffee than ashes in building a fire.

BOIL THE WATER

Be sure it is boiling. Then pour over the Coffee. This makes the kind of Coffee which scientists have found to be the best.

SERVE AT ONCE

Many a pot of perfect Coffee has been ruined by letting it cool. If you must delay serving, keep the Coffee piping hot until served, but don't boil. Re-cooking injures the flavor.

SCOUR THE COFFEE-POT

It is not enough to give the pot a hurried rinse and set it away to dry. Clean carefully and let it dry each time it is used.
