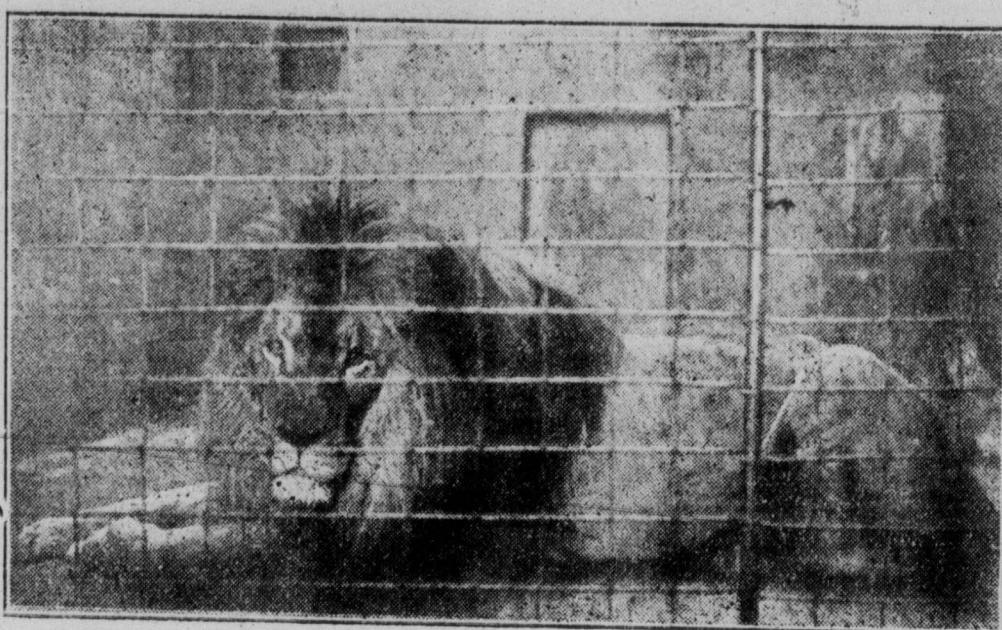

Deserved Encouragement

By this time the "C" Squadron of the 23rd Alberta Rangers, the sixty eight volunteers from Cardston and surrounding towns, is undergoing a daily routine of drill exercises in the encampment at Calgary. We wouldn't like it, and yet it would be quite natural for "the boys" to carry their heads rather too high on their return after such a sending off as they got from the people of Cardston, and the young ladies in particular.

It was not until Monday afternoon, the 13th, the happy thought occurred to Miss Beth Newton and her friends that a picnic party to the departing cavalry would leave a better taste and feeling than the old stereotyped "good-bye" and nothing more than perhaps an occasional "don't get bucked off" or "don't cut yourself on your new toys". Before half past seven, the time when the priesthood quorums assembled for the class work, the Assembly Hall was draped in bunting, and flags, the floor well swept, the seats well dusted and all in readiness for the light fantastic of the new soldier to an hour or two later. And such cake and lemonade on short notice! We might reasonably entertain fears that the boys would like to repeat the farewell part of the drill every week.

The very best things of the evening, at least to the spectators, was the grand march in military style; the sixty-eight uniforms with the sixty-eight ununiformed heroines at their sides made a most splendid sight. However, a few of the rough edges will be worn off in a couple of weeks, and those high collars and warm red coats will feel a little more agreeable than on that proverbial "first day" for all recruits.

But the end is not yet. Another side of the story is acted out at the stock yards on the Station grounds, where several guards were looking well after the mustangs that were to be shipped off the following morning on the five thirty train, which was managed by Captain H. B. Brown. After the grand ball a dozen or more of the hostesses accompani-

ed by some of their guests went straight to the station and there laughed and sang away an otherwise lonely vigil of the whole night, while the bugler echoed with repeated calls to the few sleeping and weary young men.

The instructions of the Captain were well adhered to when about four o'clock some sixty men were on the ground with suitcases, guns and bayonets, everything but those leggings, and spurs that were not sent along as they should have been with the remaining parts of the uniform several days previous to starting. By 4.45 a. m. all of the horses were loaded and every man answered to roll call as they were lined on the station platform, and received instructions from the Captain for the journey. While in this position they were addressed by J. W. Woolf M. P. P. who was on his way to Utah and Nevada. There was also present Mayor Brown and a number of other prominent citizens, with a regiment or two of girls who all shook hands with the smiling yet sleepy line. Captain Brown said "Boys, the girls have treated us right royally so give them three cheers." In response Miss Beth Newton, again at the front, said, "And here's three cheers for the boys" at which the echoes rang and the town people sat up in bed to see who had wrecked the train. Promptly at 5.30 o'clock, when all members of the troops were comfortably seated in the special cars provided for them, Captain Brown gave the "all aboard" and soon there was nothing but a medley of voices shouting goodbye and a bevy of hats, caps, cains, gloves and handkerchiefs waving with all the enthusiasm of a United States Fourth.

The systematic arrangement and orderly exodus of our first volunteer squadron reflects much credit to Captain H. B. Brown and his assistants Lieutenant Jos. Low A. Woolf, Wm. Ainscough and O. A. Tolman. The ladies who did so well for their sweethearts and husbands to be, we also congratulate—The "Star" joins the public in wishes for a pleasant trip and a safe return of our cavaliers.
