AN INFANT'S BATH.

The Way the Baby Should Be Carefully Cleaned Every Day.

An infant should be bathed once a day all over, and the groins and buttocks should be sponged as often as is necessary.

The temperature of an infant's bath should invariably be tested with a bath thermometer. The hand is never a safe judge. One hundred degrees F. is the proper temperature for a tiny baby's bath. When three months old a temperature of 95 degrees is preferable. A bath should never be too hot. The temperature of the room in which baby is to be bathed should be about 70 degrees F., and there should be no drafts. The infant should be undressed quickly and laid on nurse's or mother's lap on a double bath blanket and sponged all over with a piece of flannel, special care being exercised to get between the folds of skin where secretions are apt to accumulate. After sponging the infant is placed in the bath and the soap quickly washed off. This should not require more than one or two minutes, though the time may be lengthened for the baby to remain in the water as it grows older. After bathing the baby should be dried with a soft towel and quickly and comfortably dressed. After this operation the baby is usually ready for breakfast and then a nap. Infants should be kept out of doors as much as possible in the daytime, and if they are properly clothed there will be less possibility of their taking cold than if they are kept indoors, coddled and raised as hothouse plants.

The head of his stable orders it in metal on the harness as well as in the lacquer on the carriage door. It stares at the general public from his lap robe. His son has it stamped on his seal ring, and his daughter, if she takes up the craze for tattooing, has it indelibly marked on her anatomy. But the crowning inconsistency of the modern use of a crest is the distribution of dinner favors bearing the crest not of the recipient, but of the hostess.

Crests on handkerchiefs are by no means uncommon, and here the work is done in the most exquisite of convent embroidery. Entire sets of tableware, including gold and silver plate and the most beautiful of glazed china, are done to order that their owner may exploit the family crest. Just at present there seems absolutely no limit to the methods for flashing one's crests on less fortunate fellow men.

One well known bachelor who is extremely proud of his crest has a novel pipe rack. The background is a whole calfskin, in the center of which is burned his crest, and this is surrounded by pipe racks holding smoking equipment from every corner of the globe.

He who has not a family crest or the price thereof may employ a substitute if he happens to be in college. Here an insignia of his chosen fraternity takes the place of his family crest, adorning the furnishings of his room, his stationery and his cigarette paper, to say nothing of his jewelry.

Plans for Burial of Prefontaine's Body

HALIFAX PROCEEDINGS ARE SIMPLE, BUT THOUSANDS WILL ATTEND IN MONTREAL.

Ottawa, Ont. Jan. 2.—It is said that in connection with the landing of Prefontaine's remains at Halifax the proceedings will be the simplest character. At Montreal, however, the last tribute of respect will be attended by thousands.

From arrangements which are being made by Mayor Laporte, it is likely that the body of the late Hon. Mr. Prefontaine, minister of marine and fish will lie in state at city hall for at least two days.

It is expected the remains will reach the city about the 22nd inst. The plan is the funeral, which will be conducted in part by civil and part by government authorities, will take place from city hall. It is likely that an imposing funeral service will be held at Notre Church. The entire city council will attend the funeral in a body. The government, it is expected, will arrange to have the militia in attendance.

Head On Collision

ENGINEER AND BRAKEMAN KILLED AND MANY INJURED.

WINNIPEG, Jan. 3.—A head on collision occurred early Wednesday afternoon between two freight trains at Kinross, 45 miles east of Chapeau, in which the engineer and brakeman were killed. It is reported that three more men are killed and many injured. A wrecking train from Fort William left for the scene at three o'clock.

ITALIAN MURDERED IN NEW YORK. FIVE COUNTRYMEN UNDER ARREST.

New York, Jan. 4.—Guiseppe Riccobono was caught in a little East Side cellar and murdered with a razor. His body was found lying face upward with the blade of a razor broken into two pieces, which were laid on his breast in a sinister and almost perfect cross. His left hand had been half cut off at the wrist and his throat cut.

The police say that a band of Italians killed Riccobono in revenge, not for any harm he had done them, but because he refused to tell them what he knew about the murder recently of an Italian known as Pasquale Rocco. The police arrested on suspicion five Italians.
