## KILLED ON I. C. R.

Mangled Remains of John Scoby found near Derby Junction.

So fearfully mutilated as to be almost unrecognizable, the body of an Indian, thought to be John Scoby, of El Ground, was found lying by the I. C. R. track, about three quarters of a mile east of Derby Junction, on the northern division, this morning. An empty flask, and a gin-bottle, partially emptied of its contents, were found close by the remains, and the general belief is that the Indian was asleep on the track and was run over.

There is little doubt but that the unfortunate man was ground to death by a north-bound freight special in charge of Conductor Duff, of this city, with Driver Stephen Craig at the throttle. While the brakemen, of this train were passing along the cars at one of the stations north of the point where the accident occurred a splash of blood was noticed on the trucks of a box-car. Further examination revealed that the lower parts of two or three cars were splashed with blood, while in the trucks were found some pieces of flesh and hair, and a small portion of a man's underwear. So far as known, there was no blood, or flesh on the locomotive.

The crew on Conductor Warman's east-bound freight special from Campbellton made the gruesome discovery of the mutilated body this morning. The train was running along at its usual rate of speed after having crossed the Miramichi river bridge on the eastern side of Derby Jct. when the body was observed lying in the ditch. The train was stopped, and examination proved that the remains were those of an Indian, but none of the brakemen were aware of his identity.

Conductor Warman, who arrived in the city at noon today, said the body presented the most fearful sight he had ever seen. Both legs and both arms had been cut off, while the face was battered beyond recognition. The skull had been badly smashed, the teeth being torn away from the jaws from the force head to the nape of the neck.

The body was taken to Chatham hospital for a coroner's inquest to be held.

## SHOT AT BALMORAL

Peter Fountain shot by Policeman Seely this morning.

Policeman Seely, accompanied by Constable Gallop of Dalhousie went to Balmoral early this morning for the purpose of arresting Andrew and Peter Fountain, for whom they had a warrant. Andrew Fountain was promptly arrested and handcuffed and Seely left him with Gallop while he went to another house to arrest Peter Fountain. Seely succeeded in the arrest but was set upon by Geo. Galbert.

There was quite a scuffle and the two men got Seely down. Fountain then tried to get away but Seely got hold of him again and in the scuffle the revolver in Seely's hand was discharged, the bullet entering Fountain's abdomen, causing death a few hours later.

Policeman Seely says he was compelled to shoot in self-defence. An inquest is being held. The shooting occurred at 5 o'clock this morning. Dr. Ferguson of Dalhousie viewed the remains.
