TO RESURRECT

Schedule Prepared Months Ago to Be Considered Again.

WATER BY-LAW

Still Another Delay in Getting Power Information.

Important Business For Finance Committee This Evening.

Anyor Stewart, Secretary Brennan of the Board of Works and City Solicitor Waddell, are in Toronto to-day attend-Waddell, are in Toronto to-day attenu-ing the conference of representatives of different municipalities with the Hydro-Electric Commission. This rather signi-ficant statement from Premier Whitney in a morning paper indicates that the Hamilton representatives are not going to get the information they expected:

"Hon. Adam Beck was in the city yesterday and attended a meeting of the Ontario Cabinet, at which a good descussion of the electric power question was carried on, as Premier Whitney remarked atterwards. No promouncement of a piccemeal nature will be made for the present concerning the government's policy, and it will not oe for some time that the complete plan as projected can be expected."

The new waterworks by the

The new waterworks by-law, prepared at the beginning of the year and snelved for several months, will be considered jointly by the Finance Committee and the Fire and Water Committee tonight. It provides to give water to man-macturers for 7 1-2 cents a thousand gallons and to all other places metered, such as breweries, aerated water man-ulficturers, cattle byers, hotels, taverus siden as breweries, aerated water mandiacurers, cattle byers, botels, taverns
and caloons, photograph galleries and
water motors, 12 cents. The asylum for
the insane will be placed on a 12 1-2
cent rate while those included in the 71-2-cent rate will be brickunkers, cemetery, coiton mills, electry-platers, founderies, daries, potteries, schools, libraries, slaughter nouses and sewer pipe
works. The officials cay that under the

if they are careful. All the places mentioned have been metered at a cost of
several thousand dollars and all that
is necessary now is for the Council to
sanction the by-law so that the new
rates can go into effect at the next quarter. Meter rent will range from \$4 a
year for 1-2 inch meters to \$60 for 10
litch meters.

The Finance Committee will have an important session to-night. Besides considering the waterworks by-law with the Fire and Water Committee it will open tenders for the sale of about \$125,900 debentures. Up till noon three bids had been received. The other business includes the old matter of the Brantford Railway and Herkimer street residents, an application from the Wentworth Historical Society for a grant towards defraying the expenses of the patriotic celebration on October 22: an application for a grant towards opening a school to teach foreigners the English language and reports from the city solicitor as to complaints about the car service to the Harvester works and noise caused by the Eagle Spinning Works.

The statement prepared by the City Treasurer's Department showing the expenditure from the first of the year to date gives some indications of the overdraft that will be faced at the end of the year. Although there will be an overdraft of over \$13,000 in the Board of Works department, Chairman Sweeney says that if the unforeseen work, such as Main and Herkimer streets is Main and Herkimer streets. provided for, this will be much reduced. ELECTRIC POWER.

Result of the Meeting in Toronto Held To-day.

Toronto, Nov. 7 .- (Special) -A lengthy discussion of the details of the Provincial Government's scheme for supplying cheap electric power to the municipali ties took place at the conference be-tween Hon. Mr. Beck, Hon. J. S. Hendrie, W. J. McNaught, M. P. P., members of the Hydro-Electric Power Commis-sion, and the representatives of the Western Ontario Municipalities Niagara

Power Union.
At the conclusion of the meeting a statement was made by Mr. J. F. Fryer, of Galt, chairman of the Municipal University statement was made by Mr. J. F. Fryer, of Galt, chairman of the Municipal Union. as to the work done. The contracts to be entered into by the councils of towns and cities with the commission were fully considered. An outline of this agreement, which each municipality is at liberty to make or reject, was given, but the technical details were not presented.

The by-lew which the majority of the municipal councils will have to submit to their people to provide funds for the recetion of distribution plants was also considered.

The meeting, moreover, passed a resolution urging that the measure which will be the ordinary money by-law be presented to the people in January. A model by-law is being prepared by the Commission's solicitors, and will be sent to the municipalities and the campaign in its favor will be organized by the western power union.
