WHAT TO SEEK AFTER.

In the Book of Amos the following verse can be found:

Seek good, and not evil, that ye may live; and so the Lord, the God of hosts, shall be with you, as ye have spoken.

Seeking for that which is good is a very pleasant occupation and assuring to the passage quoted it is also profitable.

Seeking after that which is bad is a mean occupation, and seldom is a great daily newspaper issued that does not contain an account of some incident showing that seeking after that which is bad is very apt to bring present punishment.

If I should attempt to give, even in brief the scores of incidents that have come to my knowledge concerning the curses that have come upon those who sought evil, and the good things that befell those who sought good, it would take nearly all the pages of this journal to relate them.

Seek that which is good early in the morning, at noon, and in the evening. It will pay you in more ways than one so to do.

The most wretched, ruined, worst punished man I ever knew told me with his own lips, just before death ended his earthly sufferings, that he had more than repaid the harvest of what he had sown while seeking evil.

It is now over forty years since I saw that man die. It was the first, death-bed scene of a wicked man I had ever beheld, and I hoped to be spared the anguish of seeing another. All his life he had reversed the good advice found in Amos. He had practically rendered it: Seek evil, and not good.

The result was that he took a look inside the gates of Hell while in this world, and when death claimed him, he stood shuddering on the brink of the Dark River, afraid to venture into the Unknown World beyond.

He felt, at that time, what an awful thing it was for a man to spend his life seeking that which was evil.

The verse that follows the one I have quoted contains these words: "Hate the evil and love the good."

About the only way, to properly make use of the quality of hate, is to hate evil, and we cannot love the good sufficiently.

What a blessing it is that there is so much in this world to love. It can be found every day and every hour.

The last baby in a household, be it ever so small, is big enough to have concentrated on it all the love that the family can spare. What contains more innocence, goodness and sweetness than a child just old enough to make believe it can talk!

I have one at home sometimes that belongs to one of my daughters. It is so cunning that I cannot help but squeeze it. I seek for it because it is a bundle of fat goodness and I enjoy its presence.

Hunting for badness generally results in the hunter soon being made acquainted with the fact that he is the game that will be brought low, the target that will be hit at every turn. And he will have to admit that it would have been a good day for him if he had never gone hunting in that fashion.

The good people ought to live longer than bad people, providing that they are good all through.

I was acquainted with a good man, except in one thing—he would eat that which he ought not to have eaten. And the result was that that seeker after good in many things died before he was thirty years of age. If he had only sought a good food instead of bad food he would have lived to accomplish more than he did.

Seek after a good home—in this life as well as the life to come.

We were long ago admonished to seek first the Kingdom of God and His righteousness, after which all that is necessary to existence will be added.

From whence come wars and fightings among you. James 4: part of 1st verse.

The apostle James has written but a few words compared with some of the other apostles, but full of inspiration. He has fully set forth God's sovereignty and pre-eminence over all his subjects and creatures. Has all control of the devil, does not allow him to tempt us above that we are able to bear, which makes us accountable for all the gifts and knowledge he has given us, therefore from whence come wars and fightings among you. We are told we lust and have not simply because there is no God in that lust, but gratification of self.
