

AUTOMATIC TELEGRAPH SYSTEM FOR CANADA

New System Which Transmits From 2,000 to 5,000 Words a Minute Over Either a Telephone or Telegraph Wire, and is Cheapest as Well as Most Rapid in World.

New York, N. Y., April 15.—Reports renewed in this city this week that the Delany automatic telegraph system is shortly to be introduced into Canada. This system is effecting a revolution in the telegraph industry in New England and in the middle west by its ability to do over one wire the same volume of business done over six-five wires operated by the Morse hand method of transmission.

For some time strong representations have been made by prominent Canadian businessmen in this city with a view to the introduction of the Delany system into Canada. The Delany system maintains tolls that are uniform, being the same to all points regardless of distance, from the longest to the shortest. For instance, the rate for a 50-word telegraph would be 25 cents from Montreal to Vancouver, British Columbia, Manitoba, Quebec, Ontario, Prince Edward Island, or Nova Scotia.

This is the system, it will be recalled, that was a demonstration under official auspices in Winnipeg last summer over the government telephone lines. For instance, it is an unusually exhaustive character. Seven different telephons are used. Connections being held simultaneously over many different circuits in the 360-mile stretch which was being tested. The demonstration was conducted, without interfering with the transmission of the messages flashed over it at lightning speed by the automatic system.

The demonstration awakened the widest interest in the province at the time, both among professional and lay men. Patrick B. Delany, the inventor of the system which is now in commercial use by the Telespost company between Boston and Portland, Maine, and between Chicago, St. Louis, Indianapolis, Terre Haute and other cities in Massachusetts, New Hampshire, Maine, Indiana, Illinois and Missouri, is an old friend and associate of Thomas A. Edison.

One of the many wonderful features of his system is its ability to transmit a message with equal facility over either a telephone or telegraph wire, at a speed as high as 5,000 words a minute, as well as being the cheapest. It is the most rapid telegraph service in the world. The Delany system is based on a scientific principle which made this invention possible is the realization of an ambition Edison conceived as early as 1871, when he and the wizard, Edison, experimented on improvements in the Morse method of hand transmission over an special wire constructed for their purpose between Washington and New York with the idea of displacing the mails for long-distance communication.

Delany is well known in England as well as in the States, his inventions in the last thirty years having multiplied the use of the telegraph and cable many fold. The British government has used his synchronous multiplex, for instance, to transmit the messages of the Alaska-Yukon Expedition before disbanding recently conferred a special award upon the system, which was exhibited at Seattle last year by the United States patent office, as representing the conquest of a new basic principle in telegraphy.

In addition to being a boon of inestimable value to the public, the Delany automatic system will save the newspapers of the country hundreds of thousands of dollars a year in telegraph bills, through its cheap rates, great speed and promptness.

Of the \$1,500,000 expended every year for telegraph service by the Associated Press, it is figured out that approximately \$700,000 will be saved by the use of the automatic service, which it completes its continent-wide expansion.
