## Unnecessary Appointments.

Editor Evening Telegram.  
Dear Sir,—Please allow me space in your valuable journal to make a few remarks which suggest themselves on reading your comment in reference to the position left vacant by Mr. Alcock's death. This method of public waste seems to be generally adopted by the so-called People's Party.  
We notice amongst the late appointments that of Alfred J. Keats, of Merasheen, as sub-collector at this port, with the usual salary, we pre-

sume, of five hundred dollars (\$500); in place of Mr. Murphy, who held the position of Preventive Officer with a salary of two hundred and forty dollars (\$240) per year.  
Our representative, Mr. Howley, will remember that in the House of Assembly, when member for St. George's, he protested strongly against the unnecessary expense of having a Preventive Officer at Little Placentia, and reminded the Government in the strongest terms of the small amount collected here during the years previous.  
We get to remind Mr. Howley that since the date of his protest the Customs accounts show no increase of duties; that no light dues were collected since 1898; that all Customs

collecting is done by the sub-collector at Placentia; that for the last three years three dollars had not been collected by the late officer, and that in face of these indisputable facts and with his professional knowledge of conditions, Mr. Howley has been the chief factor in raising the position to sub-collector, and therefore stands condemned by all classes as sacrificing the public interest to the personal convenience of Mr. Keats.  
Trespassing on space deers me from referring to other public matters, which I will deal with at a later date. Thanking you in anticipation, Mr. Editor, I am, sir, Yours, &c. VOTER.

## Picked Up Schooner.

When the Diana was on her way home Sunday evening, about 5 o'clock and when off Fogo Island, a schooner was seen outside the steamer near a sheet of ice signalling for assistance, and the Diana bore down on her. The vessel proved to be the little schr. Tugela, 32 tons, of Change Islands, commanded by Capt. Joseph Elliott, which had been out seal hunting with a crew of 14 men and which had become pretty badly used by contact with the heavy Arctic ice. She was badly smashed about the bows and almost cut through by chafing in the ice. When sighted the men had her "hove down" on a large pan of ice and were trying to effect repairs sufficient to get her home with safety. They had the seals and ballast all stowed aft to keep her up to the head, so that repairs might be given her. She was leaking badly, and if the Diana had not put in an appearance she would have been lost, as a heavy storm set in that night, and the steamer and tow in coming along were badly buffeted for a time. The schooner was dropped about 6 or 7 miles off Change Islands, and would not have much difficulty in making the home port in safety.
