Pure Jealousy.

Apparently, nothing is so irritating to the Daily News as our success in booming the energy and enterprise of the Premier and his party. We hesitate to attribute the irritation to spleen at its own failure and to jealousy at our signal success in spreading the tidings of Government activity. We fear, however, we have no alternative. In spite of the risk of exciting dyspepsia and arousing the green-eyed monster, we must insist on our right to co-operate in making the Premier and his party better known to the people. We really have no desire to gloat over our contemporary's failure to exploit successfully the tidings of his party. But we cannot refrain from doing our duty in the premises. We regret deeply the necessity of referring to these matters, and shall do so only so far as it is a matter of public interest, and only so far as it furnishes the reason of the need of our co-operation.

To explain the matter clearly, we must revert to a little local history. When our friend was converted to his present political faith, his eyes were opened, and he saw what he had never seen before.

On a sudden he discovered the brains and energy of Sir Edward Morris. His discovery so stunned him that he seems never to have got over his surprise. So astounded was he that he still babbles "Working Premier" as if he cannot yet fully believe the reality of it all. So obsessed is he with his amazing discovery that he has never given adequate attention to a proper propagation of the tidings. Unfortunately he was handicapped at the start. He began badly. How the Colonial Secretary who signed the deal of 1898 could have made the blunder of dubbing the new party of 1908 the People's Party is one of those mysteries we have no hope of clearing up. The mistake was so vital that it has vitiated all his honest and elaborate attempts to exploit successfully the undoubted energy and activity of the Premier and his party. The misnomer offended public taste in the fitness of things. It did more. It created a desire for an apt designation of that Party. A witty correspondent, who blushes every time his good deeds are mentioned, supplied the omission. We gave it publicity. The public caught on. It was quite a hit. Honor was given to whom honor was due. The energy and activity of the Premier and his party were fixed on the public attention. What a world of appreciation passed from mind to mind as the name "Picnic Party and Picnic Chief" passed from mouth to mouth. We know Sir Edward properly appreciates our efforts. Indeed, the last time he spoke to us he told us he had just come from a "Picnic." This shows that he at least appreciates what we are doing for him. We do not complain of any lack of appreciation in the Premier. We do complain, however, of lack of

appreciation on the part of the Daily News. We get no thanks whatever for our frequent references to the doings of the Picnic Party. No matter how much we endeavor to supply what the Daily News omits, our morning contemporaries never appreciate. For example, we told of the rush of the Picnic Chief in a special car to Placentia for those stunts in Burin. The Daily News failed to mention the dash and the special car and yet the Daily News has not a word of approval. The Daily News omitted to tell of the Premier's energetic wrestle for the Spur Line. We gave publicity to this burst of energy. We told of the fight for Hague arbitration fees. We have mentioned many times the marked activity of the Premier and his party in distributing land grants, patronage, plums of all kinds and sizes. We claim to have made a specialty in publishing the hard work of the Premier and his party in these directions. These lines are not worked by the Daily News. Why then should the Daily News be disgruntled at us. We do not claim any exclusive right to work these lines. We shall be only too pleased if the Daily News will do justice to even if the Daily News severely ignores these forms of energy of our working Premier, we shall give them due publicity.

No matter how splenetic or jealous the Daily News may be, we shall insist on our right to exploit the energy of the Premier and his party. An Interesting Exhibit.

There are now on exhibition in Messrs.
