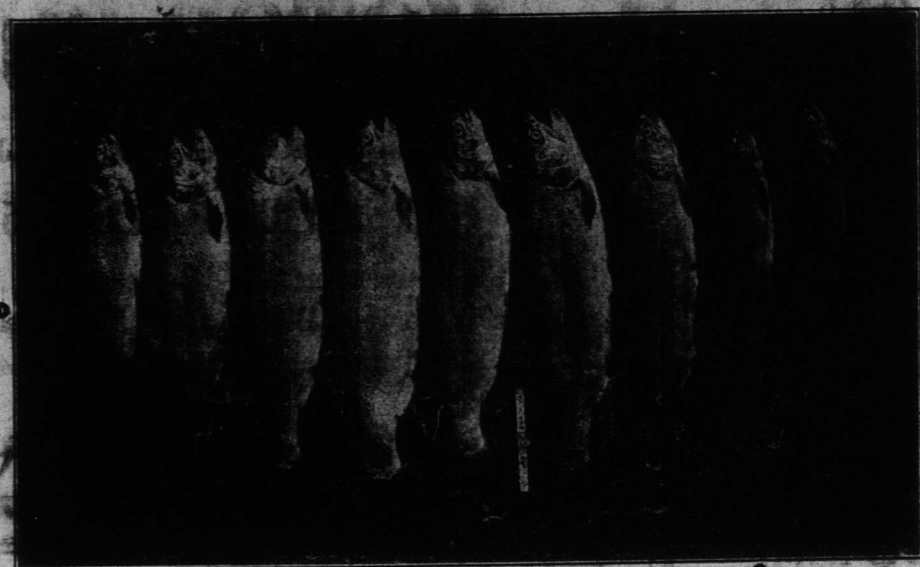

Obituary.

MR. F. PERRY.

On Sunday the death occurred at New Brighton, England, of Mr. Frank Perry, a former Anglo-Superintendent at Heston, Co. Kent. He was 68 years of age. He was born in New Brunswick, and came to England in 1884. He was a member of the Royal Society of Engineers, and was a very successful engineer. He was married to Mrs. F. Perry, and they had three children. He was a very kind and generous man, and was very popular among his friends. He died of a heart attack.

Two Drown When Sailing Boat Capsized.

Kingston, Ont., July 10.—In a sailing accident late last night, two young men living in Kingston, Frank Exton and Howard King, lost their lives by drowning. They were employed at the locomotive works. Their companion, William P. Irvine, was saved.

The three were out in a small sailboat, a lively gale was blowing, and when about to come in at the ship at the foot of Union Street the boat ran into a submerged pier and capsized.

King and Exton could swim, and started out to make shore, but went down. Irvine could not swim, and clung to the boat until rescued by men from the Kingston Shipbuilding Company, who heard his cries for help.

Search has been made all morning for the bodies of the other two men, but as yet they have not been recovered. Exton is an Englishman and has only been in this country a short time.

King is a Scotchman, and came to Kingston recently from Toronto.

The Howe Inquest at North Sydney.

North Sydney, July 10.—An inquest was held yesterday afternoon into the cause of death of David Howe, chief engineer of the steamer Bruce, who dropped dead yesterday morning while the boat was on her way up from Port aux Basques. After hearing the evidence of the engineers and other members of the Bruce's crew, the jury returned a verdict of death from natural causes. The remains were taken in charge by Undertaker W. J. Dooley, and after the inquest were prepared for burial and removed to the Masonic lodge rooms, whence they were taken this morning to the Bruce for shipment to Port aux Basques to-night. The officers and crew of both the Bruce and Linrose attended the funeral in a body. Mr. Howe, who was 39 years of age, was a native of Dundee, Scotland, and leaves a wife and four children at Port aux Basques.

Fire Last Night.

Last night reflections of a big blaze attracted a large concourse of people to Signal Hill where a small dwelling or hut was on fire. The structure, which was completely gutted and destroyed, belonged to and was occupied by a poor creature named Thomas Sweeney; he is almost totally blind and has not the best of sense. During the afternoon Sweeney looked his door and went out. He returned half an hour later, and it was believed while endeavouring to light a fire in the stove or light his pipe he dropped a lighted match on some clothing which ignited and a blaze followed. An alarm was quickly sent in from box 12 bringing the men of the Central and East End Fire Stations to the scene. On arrival the place was a mass of flames. The great difficulty of the firemen was lack of water as the nearest place a stream could be got was from Lindberg's Brewery. This was thought inadvisable and water from the ponds nearby was procured to extinguish the fire but not before the greater portion of Sweeney's house and its contents had gone up in smoke. It was well there was no wind prevailing as houses close by would certainly have ignited.

In view of last night's experience provision should at once be made for an extra service in that section of the town.

LONDON, July 14.
 The Daily Telegraph's correspondent with the Greek Army, says that the Greeks, to date, have captured 82 guns and 10,000 prisoners.

BISLEY, July 14.
 The second final stage shooting for the Empire Match Trophy, resulted in a victory for Britain; Australia taking second place, Canada third and India fourth.

DUNKIRK, Pa., July 14.
 Capt. McIntyre and his wife lost their lives, when the barge Annabel Wilson, bound from Erie, Pa., to Port Colborne, foundered in Lake Erie off this city. The crew clung to a small boat and were rescued.

MARSEILLES, July 14.
 The charred wreckage of an aeroplane, with the incinerated bodies of two aviators lying in ashes, was found this morning near Nonancourt on the railroad from Paris to Gravelle. The identity of the men could not be ascertained.

LONDON, July 14.
 The Constantinople correspondent of the Mail reports long negotiations between Turkey and Roumania. He believes that an understanding has been reached. Roumania wants five torpedo boats, which Turkey is willing to lead on condition that Roumania supports her.

SALONIKI, July 14.
 Greek troops, to-day, occupied the town of Melnik, 55 miles north of Saloniki, and are advancing toward the Bulgarian frontier. The Bulgarians further retreated to Kibala, close to the famous pass. The Greek commanders anticipate that the next big fight will take place in Bulgarian territory.

LOS ANGELES, July 14.
 Two meddlesome youths, who played with a train whistle, are responsible for the loss of 12 lives and injury to 200 persons near here last night, when two Pacific Electric trains collided, telescoping two cars and wrecking another, at Vinuya Station, near the city limits. Many of the injured will die.

LONDON, July 14.
 A Belgrade despatch says that the Serbian invasion of Bulgaria has been successful, but was confined to the district between the frontier and Kustendil line. The Serbians advancing and making good progress. The Mail's correspondent sends the following despatch: There has been fighting since Wednesday. The weather is wet and the roads heavy. Russian photographer, who visited the scene of the Krivolak battle, found evidence of the Bulgarian

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
