The Howe Inquest at North Sydney.

North Sydney, July 10 .- An inquest was held yesterday afternoon into the cause of death of David Howe, chief engineer of the steamer Bruce, who dropped dead yesterday morning Lightning Bolt while the boat was on her way up from Port aux Basques. After hearing the evidence of the engineers and other members of the Bruce's crew, the jury returned a verdict of death from natural causes. The remains were taken in charge by Un-Mr. Howe, who was 39 years of age, was a native of Dundee, Scotland, and leaves a wife and four children at Port aux Basques.
