Technical Education.

A strenuous campaign is being conducted in the eastern provinces of the Dominion of Canada, to popularize Technical Education. In almost any issue of the newspapers which come to hand from these parts, will be found a report of a lecture by Dr. Robertson on this subject, and giving the results of the Commission of which he was chairman, which travelled throughout the States, Great Britain and Ireland, and several countries in Europe investigating what was being done in vocational training. Dr. Robertson especially emphasizes the industrial revolution which has been effected in Denmark by means of Technical training and co-operative effort, decayed agriculture has been stimulated and revived and made the most prosperous in Europe in the course of a period of twenty years. He also lays much stress on the transformation which is being effected in Ireland by the same means. The report of the Canadian Commission has been published. It is lengthy and takes up four volumes. The whole effort should stimulate us in Newfoundland to be up and doing. For we are undoubtedly very backward in provision of this nature and especially in the matter of night schools, where very much of this kind of training is being done elsewhere on those who are at work in the day time. Some little work has been done in the past, but those efforts have lapsed after a time. Another effort is being made under Capt. Saunders, which deserves support. What is wanted, however, is a scheme which shall form part of the regular government machinery. It may be remembered that such a policy forms a plank in the platform of the Opposition Party, as laid down in the Manifesto of Sir Robert Bond. But we need to go further and to reform gradually our whole school curriculum, in such a way as to development of the full activities of the child. We are pleased to find that Miss Dawson, of Bishop Spencer College, dwelt on this phase of Educa-

tion in the "paper" she read before the Current Events Club. We clip out a few paragraphs, which are "to the point":
 "From time immemorial the three R's have been regarded as of primary importance, whilst singing, drawing and physical exercises were considered as of secondary value. Oral composition being unheard of, the splendid art of modelling, story-telling, and dramatized history were considered as wicked inventions.
 "To form a new curriculum, we must place the subjects according to educational value, that is, beginning with the purely primary, and ending with the purely derivative.
 "A modern curriculum drawn up by well known psychologists has been adapted in several schools in England with most satisfactory results. It is as follows:—
 "1. Physical activities—including manual occupations.
 "2. Nature Study in its broader sense.
 "3. Oral speech—including story-telling and music.
 "4. Drawing, (taught specially).
 "5. Arithmetic.
 "6. Reading.
 "7. Writing and Spelling."

E.; Viking's men report the following ships—Viking, 6,000; Terra Nova, 24,000; no other reports; on the south west end of patch; don't know when ship struck whitecoats."

Overdue Vessel Turns Up.

Barq. E. S. Hocken Reported Safe— Forced back to Barbados Owing to Adverse Weather.

The barquentine E. S. Hocken, Capt. Martyn, seventy days out from Macleod to this port in ballast to A. S. Rendell & Company, as reported elsewhere in this issue, has turned up safely.

To-day a message was received from Barbados to the effect that the vessel had put in there, having been forced back owing to stress of weather. No further particulars were received and it is not known whether the vessel met with any damage or not. However, news of her safe arrival will be received with genuine gladness and will allay the grave concern expressed. The "Hocken" carried a crew of eight hands, besides Capt. Martyn's son, who was a passenger on board.
