**Does Prohibition Prohibit?****The Case for the Moderates.**

INCENTIVES TO LAW-UPHOLDING.

(By WARWICK SMITH.)

—ARTICLE V.

a plan of controlled drinking to replace the uncontrolled drinking we have under Prohibition. Of course I am not tied to any particular detail. Any other plan to control drinking, that would be likely to work satisfactorily, would have my support.

My argument in these articles is not so much addressed to those who are prejudiced in favour of prohibition nor to those who are prejudiced against it. I appeal to intelligent, thinking, unprejudiced people to consider not theories but facts. We want to get the best possible under the circumstances. "Compromise" is the word and it is a word which the extremists hate. It is most often what results from two sets of extremists pulling different ways. Like a knot in a rope, used in a tug-of-war, the result of two opposite and equal forces is rest. The issue will be decided by the weight thrown on either side by the moderates.

Would a coupon system of controlled drinking work out in practice? Well it would cost the Colony less money to enforce, because the expense would be covered by the profits. There would be two incentives to the ordinary, plain, sober citizen to give the law his support. One would be the desire to decrease drunkenness, and in this he would have the support of the Prohibitionists themselves. His opponents would be a miserable handful of grog-swillers.

The second and greatest incentive would be fear. The sane and sober citizen who takes an occasional glass would use all his influence to discourage breaches of the law. He would not view law-breaking with the indifference he would exhibit towards a law that did not interest him. He

would say "That fellow is risking my bottle" (or flask as the case may be). "I am going to put a stop to this." Every influence would be against the law-breaker. Then there is the man whose ideal is liberty. He would recognize the danger of a further curtailment of that liberty, if men were permitted to reel around the streets as we see them every day. The earnest Temperance worker would do his best to see that drunkenness became less, and that Prohibitionist would be a fanatic indeed who would use his influence to keep a drunkard from going to goal to sober up in order that he might put the whole country into prohibition again.

There are people who look upon Prohibition as the end to be attained, whereas it is only a means which some people are using to attain the end. That must be born in mind. Prohibition is not a fetish to be worshipped. It is only a weapon, and a weapon to be useful must do the work it is intended to do. Then the weapon should be a suitable one. A stick is often as effective as a sword. We do not shoot partridges with rifle-bullets and a crowd may be as easily dispersed by a fireman's hose as by a machine gun. We do not use sledge-hammers to crack nuts. These metaphors I have used only to show that it has never been proved that Prohibition was the only remedy for intemperance. There are other methods less drastic that will better attain the same end.

It is quite logical to say that you cannot get drunk if you cannot get liquor; but it is another thing to say that Prohibition will keep men from getting liquor. The question is "Has it?"

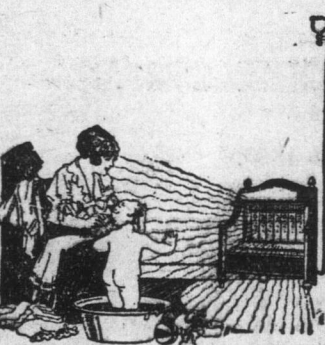
**Rosalind's Passengers.**
