Ship That Vanished

ONLY CAPTAIN'S BODY FOUND OUT OF 29 SOULS.

Extraordinary revelations were made at a Board of Trade inquiry at the Law Courts into the loss of the steamship El Kahira, 2084 tons, belonging to the Trading and Coaling Company, Ltd., of St. Helen's-place, E.C.—She went on a voyage to the Mediterranean in July of last year, and was never seen again. Mr. T. A. Bucknill, for the Board of Trade, related that the El Kahira was built in 1892 at Glasgow, and sailed from London on July 7, 1922 for Mediterranean ports, with a cargo of sugar, one passenger, and crew of 28 hands. On August 1st, the body of the Master, Captain Pepperell of Cardiff, was picked up 600 miles off Cape Griensz. The vessel with all hands completely disappeared, and no wreckage was ever discovered. Points which the Court would have to consider were the complete absence of the wireless apparatus that vessels of this tonnage were compelled by law to carry, the general seaworthiness of the vessel, and the amount of cargo that was carrying. It appeared, counsel went on, that the management of the vessel had been undertaken by Oliver and Co. Ltd., and a director of that company, as well as the marine superintendent, would be called for to give evidence. Mrs. Pepperell, widow of the master, mentioned that her husband, who was making a first voyage on the vessel, expressed surprise that it was allowed to start without a wireless installation. She received a letter from her husband, which was given to the pilot off Dover and in which he stated there had been engine trouble and that "everything seems to be going wrong." Mr. Milne, of the Bureau Veritas, a French society which issues classification certificates to merchant vessels, told the court that at the time of her last sailing the El Kahira had lost her classification on the ground that she was considerably overdue for a survey in dry dock. Mr. Herman Augustus Bevan, who served on the El Kahira for four months in 1919, gave evidence that he re-engaged as mate in July, 1922, but only remained three days, as he was not satisfied with the ship. The hearing was adjourned.

Tugboats Had Stormy Trip

Leaving Southampton on September 12th, the seagoing tug Ocean Eagle having in tow the harbor tug Ballin Ballock, arrived in port at 1 p. m. yesterday after a very boisterous passage. Both tugs are bound to St. John, N.B., having been purchased by the Dry Dock and Shipbuilding Co. there. The Ocean Eagle is about 300 tons gross and seven tons net, whilst the Ballin Ballock registers 3 tons net. Two days after the tugs left Southampton they put into Cardiff for coal. Leaving there on the 18th inst, the little ships headed for this side of the Atlantic. On the 22nd inst. a raging storm was run into, and as seas swept the ships it was decided to put back to land. Southampton was again reached on the 28th inst. After a few days delay in effecting repairs the trip was again commenced. All went well until Monday last when bad weather threatened the destruction of the little ships. One heavy sea boarding the Ocean Eagle, knocked out Chief Officer Thimouth of that ship. Fortunately he received no other injury than the loss of two teeth. The ships are taking bunker coal at Harvey's and will likely resume the voyage to-morrow.

Keys of Gibraltar


CEREMONIALS AT INSTALLATION OF NEW GOVERNOR.

Impressive ceremonies, including the presentation of the keys of the fortress, marked the installation of the new Governor of Gibraltar, General Sir Charles Munro. The administration of the oaths took place on the date of the ballroom at the Government House, popularly known as the "Convent" because before the British occupation it had been the home of a community of Franciscan friars. The ballroom itself was formerly the nave of the convent chapel. The fact of General Munro having subscribed to the oaths was announced by a salute from the guns of the fortress. Then followed the presentation of the keys. Gibraltar alone among the British possessions boasts of the appointment of a Key Sergeant. One of his duties is to see that the keys are safely deposited nightly on a velvet cushion on the dinner table in front of the Governor.
