

THE AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE AND EXPERIMENTAL FARM.

REPORT IN FAVOR OF GUELPH. The Council of the Agricultural and Arts Association held their adjourned meeting yesterday in Toronto, and drew up a report in which was embodied their opinion of the land they had visited in the neighborhood of Guelph, as to its suitability for the Agricultural College and Experimental Farm. That report was sent to the Commissioner of Agriculture and will most probably be presented and read in the House to-day.

We cannot give the report to-day, but we may state on the most undoubted authority that it is in favour of having the Farm located in this neighborhood, and that the Council were unanimous in coming to this decision. It remains now for the House to say whether it will back up the Government in sanctioning the removal of the recommendation of the Council.

We will be in a position to say more on the subject when the report is published. THE WOOD SLANDER CASE. This case, which has for some time been under investigation by a Committee of the House, was disposed of on Monday. We need not rehearse the facts of the case, as they are well known. Suffice to say that Mr. M. C. Cameron charged Mr. Blaké with offering Mr. Wood a corrupt inducement to retire from the late Government. The Committee after a careful investigation found that there was not a shadow of truth in the charge, reported to that effect, and the report was adopted by a large majority.

Thus Mr. Cameron's mountain has dwindled down to the smallest possible mole hill. He and a few of the most bitter opponents of the Government sought to refer the report back but they were completely foiled, and now on Mr. Cameron's shoulders must rest the responsibility of having preferred a charge which was found to have no foundation in fact. What do the Conservatives now think of their precious leader in the House?

NEWS ITEMS. NARROW GAUGE MEETING. The meeting in Kincaidine on Saturday night was attended by nearly five hundred people. It lasted from five o'clock until about eleven, and was an overwhelming success for the broad gauge. The vote in its favor being nearly three to one, the full strength of both deputations was concentrated at it, and excellent speeches were made all round. This closed the series of meetings, but the narrow gaugers have called meetings of their own.

FIRE. A very destructive fire occurred on Monday morning at an early hour at Tilsonburg, by which a large number of persons suffered. The amount of the loss is not yet stated, though it must be great. The fire-engine was useless, and the flames consequently made great headway, until they consumed all inflammable material within reach. The destruction by fire of a hotel at Lindsay, and blacksmith's shop at Fort Erie, are also reported; while most deplorable news comes to hand from Nova Scotia, announcing the burning to death of five children in a building.

MAYOR HALL ARRANGED. Mayor Hall, of New York, was on Monday brought before the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court for trial for alleged irregularities. He was represented by his own law partners, as well as other distinguished legal gentlemen. The number of those implicated is said to be very large. Grave charges are also made against Superintendent Kelso of the police, Judge Dowling and Hank Smith, the first of these being especially connected with gamblers and sharing their profits, as well as counting at the escape of notorious thieves and even highway robbers.

BRUTAL MURDER IN YORK STATE. On Sunday night a farmer named Daniel Kramer, residing about nine miles west of Auburn, Schuyler county, on the line of the Schuylkill and Susquehanna Railroad, was brutally murdered, and his wife left for dead. Kramer's son, on entering his father's house on Monday morning, found his mother on the bed with her skull fearfully fractured and still alive, but unable to speak. The father was found 100 yards from the house with his brains beaten out and frozen to the ground. No trace of the murderers has been discovered. The murderers robbed the house. Mrs. Kramer cannot recover. The heavy club used to commit the bloody deed is in the hands of the authorities.

ALL EQUAL HERE. It is related of the Duke of Wellington that once when he remained to "take sacrament" at his parish church, a very poor old man had gone up the opposite aisle, and, reaching the communion, knelt down by the side of the Duke. Some one—a poor wretch, probably—came and touched the poor man on the shoulder, and whispered him to move further away, or rise and wait until the duke had received the bread and wine. But the eagle eye and quick ear of the great commander caught the meaning of the touch and that whisper. He clasped the old man's hand and held him to prevent his rising, and in a reverential undertone, but most distinctly, said, "Do not move—we are all equal here!"

Alfred Waddington, the projector of the Pacific Railway, has just died in the Ottawa Hospital, from the effects of small-pox, after eleven days illness. Two women have made application to Commodore Vanderbilt for the office of conductor on the New York Central Railway.

A new cable, four thousand miles in length, is being manufactured in London for the European and South American Telegraph Company.

Subscriptions to wipe out the German war indemnity continue to pour into Paris from all parts of the country. The fund has now reached 23,000,000 francs.

The Japanese Embassy have reached Chicago. On their arrival they were met by a committee of the common Council, and a dinner which included greetings were passed between the Mayor and Iwakura, the principal member of the Embassy.

The projectors of the North Shore Railway, in the Province of Quebec, intend that line as much as possible an air line, not exceeding 160 miles. The preliminaries of the work will begin in March, and the grading will commence in May. Soundings are already being made at Three Rivers for bridge foundations. The term for completion is fixed at three years.
