

New York is enjoying warm weather—there was a case of sun-stroke on Sunday.

The number of immigrants who arrived at Quebec within twenty-four hours last week was 2,070.

A terrible tornado passed over part of Iowa on Thursday, causing great destruction of property and loss of life.

Heavy rains in the vicinity of Quebec have swollen the St. Lawrence river to about 5,000,000 feet of water have gone adrift.

A woman named Courtney, residing near Halifax, gave birth to four children on Thursday, being the second time with in two years. Though only married ten years, she has seventeen children.

The attempt to blow up the bows of the wrecked steamer, Remond in the Lachine Rapids, which is obstructing the channel, with dynamite, was unsuccessful. The flames from the fuse burned the woodwork to the water's edge without an explosion taking place.

It is understood that the Russian Government has assented to the proposition of Ferdinand de Lesseps for the construction of a line of complete railway communication across the continent from St. Petersburg connecting with the English Railways to India and Calcutta.

SILVER MINING.—The latest news from Thunder Bay more than exceeds the expectations that had been formed of the mineral richness of that locality. The mine at Silver Islet had fairly outdone itself, the product in a single day having been to the value of over \$6,000, from the labor of but twenty-five men. The company has on hand over \$650,000, which is to be shipped down upon the opening of navigation.

Three mines have also given evidence of lasting richness, and in other directions experience shows that well directed labor is all that is needed to develop a most extraordinary mineral wealth.
