CALEDONIANS AND HILLHURST BATTLE EIGHTY MINUTES; GAME ENDED IN A SCORELESS DRAW

Championship of City Football League Still Undecided; Both Teams Played Brilliant Defensive Game Before Two Thousand Spectators

The championship of the Calgary city football league is still undecided, the game between Caledonians and Hillhurst on Saturday afternoon resulting in a scoreless draw. This is the fourth time the teams have met this season in the league competition, one game not being counted owing to both teams having been played, and a fifth is now necessary. This will probably be played off on Saturday afternoon next, provided suitable arrangements can be made with the baseball managers who have two games scheduled, and the soccer game may possibly be sandwiched between the two.

As expected, the game attracted a very large crowd, and there must have been quite two thousand people present when the teams took the field, the Caledonians coming out first, to the cheers of a large number of their supporters, and Hillhurst followed closely upon them, and also received a warm reception.

The Caledonians team was the same as has done duty for them in all their recent games, but the formation of the Hillhurst club was greatly re-arranged. No one knew what the team would be until just before the game. Archie Stewart had been away at the coast and only returned on Saturday morning, and one or two of their other players were doubtful starters. However, they Hillhurst forwards broke away and some fine combination was seen between them. The ball was put in from the right wing and Johnston headed for the crossbar. NATIONAL COMISH MAKES SNAPPER NAVARSON DID THE IRON MAN STUNT

Drafted Player May Not be Released Under Optional Agreement to Minor League

Chicago, Aug. 30.—The National Baseball Commission, after having received many inquiries as to the right of a major league club to release a player to a minor league club between August 15 and close of the current season, under an optional agreement conferring on the releasing club the privilege of recalling the player during the following year, today issued the following regulations which will be enforced in the future:

"A player drafted by a major league club cannot be released at any time within a year of his selection under a straight or an optional agreement until all of the provisions of section 9, article VI, of the revised national agreement have been complied with."

"A player released by a major league club between August 15 and the close of the current season under an optional agreement, provided for his recall in the following year will be subject to the drafting privileges of all major league clubs and of all minor league clubs of higher classification than that in which he is released."

"Rule 29 of the commission must be strictly observed before a player is drafted by a major league club through the purchase of his release or by draft can be released during the year following that in which such club obtained title to his services."



NEW YASKEE RECORD FOR ONE MILE SWIM
Chicago, Aug. 31.—L. E. Goodwin of the N. Y. A. C. established a new U. S. record of 25:55 flat in the National A. A. U. one mile outdoor swim held today in the Lincoln park lagoon under the auspices of the Illinois Athletic club. He finished nearly a minute ahead of A. C. Rathel of the I. A. C. who was second in 26:30.

The former record of 25:40 2-5 was made by H. J. Kelly of the N. Y. A. C. in the championship at New York, N. Y., in 1910. Goodwin finished second to Kelly in this race in 25:41 2-5. He shattered the old mark in sensational fashion, clearly outclassing the field of six other performers.

BABY RELIANCE II. MADE NEW WORLD'S RECORD SATURDAY

Huntington, N. Y., Aug. 31.—The United States won the first motor boat race of the International series for the Harnsworth trophy on Huntington bay and established a world's record for a thirty mile course.

The winning boat, J. P. Blackton's Baby Reliance II, 20 feet in length, was the smallest of the fleet of five that started, but she covered the course one minute and ten seconds quicker than the British challenger, Maple Leaf IV, a 25 foot craft owned by E. Mackay Edgell.

British boat, Moon, owned by the Marquis of Anglesey, which finished third, was about seven minutes or about four miles behind the leaders. The Baby Reliance II spun around the 7.12 miles course four times at the record speed of 27.13 knots, or 42.63 miles an hour and was greeted by the cheers of thousands aboard a fleet of nearly five hundred yachts as she finished in the lead of the challenger. The elapsed time of 48 minutes 29 seconds was 2 minutes better than the record set by the Dizzie over the 20 mile course.
