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CALEDONIANS AND HILLHURST BATTLE EIGHTY MINUTES; GAME ENDED IN A SCORELESS DRAW

Championship of City Football League Still Undecided; Both Teams Played Brilliant Defensive Game Before Two Thousand Spectators

The championship of the Calgary city football league is still undecided, the game between Callies and Hillhurst on Saturday afternoon resulting in a goalless draw. This is the fourth time the teams have met this season in the league competition, one game not being counted owing to a change in the league having been played, and a fifth is now necessary. This will probably be played off on Saturday afternoon next, provided suitable arrangements can be made with the baseball management, who have two games scheduled, and the soccer game may possibly be sandwiched between the two.

As expected, the game attracted a very large crowd, and there must have been quite two thousand people present when the teams took the field, the Callies coming out first, to the cheer of a large number of their supporters, and Hillhurst followed closely upon them, and also received a warm reception.

The Callies' team was the same as has done duty for them in all their recent games, but the formation of the Hillhurst club was greatly re-arranged. No one knew what the team would be until just before the game. Archie Stewart had been away at the coast and only returned on Saturday morning, and one or two of their other players were doubtful starters. However, their Hillhurst forwards broke away and some fine combination was seen between them. The ball was put in from the right wing and Johnston headed against the crossbar. An exciting scrimmage followed but the Callies eventually staved off danger for a time at the expense of a corner. A free kick against Strang for bringing down A. Wakelyn next put the Callies goal in danger and another corner was forced. Neither of these, however, brought any advantage and nothing but the smartness of Stratton and Killeen kept the ball in play. A misunderstanding between Melville and Wakelyn Saturday morning led to a run in but before he could get to the ball Sutton left charge and three were away.

Custodians Worked Hard Both custodians had to stop some difficult shots, Gilhooly having kept one out from Melville and Strang at the other end, and testing Sutton, but they were both safe and the change of play was made in the nick of time. In the second half Stan Wakelyn retained his position centre forward. Archie Holland, strange for bringing down the bar at the Callies end and was preparing to shoot Mortimer rushed in and struck in the nick of time. A mistake by Cooper then let in Stewart who got away on one of his lightning runs and finished up with a good shot which Gilhooly managed to stop and put past for a corner.

When the crowd saw Stewart away with such a clear lead they figured out that a certain goal was in the air and the Callies supporters heaved a sigh of relief.

they saw Gilhooly get rid. But if one goal had a narrow escape the other soon had one also and a centre from Towill which went to Grindley put Hillhurst shaking. Grindley slid it forward swiftly towards goal, Sutton catching, nearly just as the whistle went for offside against Grindley. Hillhurst's attack has been injured and was not in first class form but Stewart after beating Blair and Cooper forced Gilhooly to concede another corner but without result.

Time wore on the while and with neither team having the advantage matters were looking most interesting. However, then Melville made another mistake and three forwards rushed up to take advantage but Ross had covered his partner and got the ball away.

Brilliant Defensive Playings Soon after the whistle went for time, and the whole eighty minutes had gone without a score. This was due to the brilliancy of both defenses, the defenders on both sides being the utmost.

There was some pretty work seen between both sets of forwards. The teams are very closely matched and should Hillhurst may have had the more of the game on Saturday a draw was a very fair result.

NATIONAL COMISH MAKES IMPORTANT RULING

Drafted Player May Not be Released Under Optional Agreement to Minor League

Cincinnati, Aug. 30.—The National Baseball Commission, after having received many inquiries as to the right of a major league club to release a player to a minor league club between August 15 and close of the current season, under an optional agreement conferring on the releasing club the privilege of recalling the player during the following year, today issued the following regulations which will be enforced in the future:

"A player drafted by a major league club cannot be released at any time within a year of his selection under a straight or an optional agreement until all of the provisions of section 9, article VI, of the revised national agreement have been complied with."

"A player released by a major league club between August 15 and the close of the current season under an optional agreement provided for his recall in the following year will be subject to the drafting privileges of all major league clubs and of all minor league clubs of higher classification than that in whose service he is after August 26th."

"Rule 29 of the commission must be strictly observed before a player secured by a major league club through the purchase of his release or by draft can be released during the year following that in which such club obtained title to his services."

"A player recalled under an optional agreement have been complied with, cannot again be released under an optional agreement."

BRONKS MADE CLEAN SWEEP OF ANOTHER SERIES FROM ESKS

Two Games Saturday Made Total of Nine in a Row From Esk

Edmonton, Sept. 2.—The Bronks made a clean sweep of the series on Saturday, when they grabbed both ends of the doubleheader from the Eskimos. This makes nine straight games in the five game series in Calgary the week before last, and four games in the last week's here. Pete Standridge and Heine Heinrich were the opposing slabmen in the afternoon game. The Bronks played errorless ball and backed up Standridge with luster, timely swats, which netted fourteen runs. The Eskimos collected ten hits off Standridge's delivery, but the beautiful fielding of the Bronks allowed but two Eskimo runs to score.
