Peculiar Properties of Musk.

The musk of commerce comes, for the greater part, from Tachienlu, a town in China that is known as the "Gateway to Tibet." Three thousand pounds of this odoriferous substance is exported annually. The bulk of it goes to France, where it is used to manufacture perfume. Musk is an essential ingredient of almost all perfumes. Musk has certain radioactive properties that cause the odor of the perfume to be carried through the air in a very extraordinary way. The radioactive property of musk affects the natives who carry it to market very strangely. If a package of musk is held close to the body for any length of time it produces sores that

are similar in character to those caused by pure radium. Musk is obtained from a sort of gland, or pouch, of the male musk deer and it is secreted only during certain seasons of the year. The musk deer is a small animal, seldom more than three feet long and twenty-two inches in height. It is becoming more and more scarce every year, and at the present rate will eventually become extinct.

BURGLAR KEPT BOOKS.

Unique Criminal Was Killed in the Western States.

Police say the famed Raffles never dreamed of scientific burglary reduced to the system that Paul Weggen, a former police chief had perfected to loot mansions of the wealthy in Minneapolis, Kansas City, St. Louis and Pacific Coast cities of thousands of dollars' worth of goods. Weggen was killed in a hand-to-hand fight with a policeman in Portland, Ore., and his home revealed the secrets of years of successful robbery in the West and Northwest.

Ten years ago the women's clubs of Parsons, Kan., gave Weggen a medal. He represented the city in all patriotic and civic shows. He was the town's hero. He was known throughout Southeastern Kansas as the premier police chief. He was a fearless enemy of the underworld. The police thought, "He rode his bicycle by night into the nests of crime and arrested violators of the law as they had never been arrested before. He was quick with his revolver and shot three men, disabling them all."

when they attempted to overpower him in one of these one-man raids. Once a negro bit off one of Weggen's fingers, and his opponent was loosed he drew his revolver and shot down the attacker.

Then one day Parsons awoke to find some detectives from Kansas City had accused Weggen of instigating the robbery of the city's biggest dry goods store. Weggen fled. The sleuths followed him and arrested him. He was convicted of the crime in Parsons and led through the city handcuffed. When he served three years at Lansing the business men of Parsons asked for a pardon for him. It was granted. A short time later he was sentenced to 25 years for leaping on the running board of Howard J. Vrooman's motor car on Cliff drive and relieving Vrooman of a \$250 watch.

Weggen was sent to the penitentiary at Jefferson City and became a trusty in the light plant, November 7 last he threw the light plant out of commission and escaped in the darkness.

When Weggen was killed in Portland the other day the police found more than \$5,000 worth of goods, believed to have been stolen in Minneapolis, in his home, and with it his unique bookkeeping system.

Islands in Pawn.
The Orkney Islands do not really belong to Great Britain. In the sense that they were ever ceded by treaty or acquired by conquest. They were simply transferred by Denmark to Scotland in 1469 in pledge for the payment of the dowry of the Princess of Denmark, who was married to James III., King of Scotland.

In the deed of transfer, which is still in existence, it is specially mentioned that Denmark shall have the right to redeem them at any future time, by paying the original amount of the dowry with interest to date. There is no likelihood, however, that Denmark will ever attempt to exercise her right of redemption, because 60,000 florins, the original amount of the dowry, would amount to perhaps a trillion of pounds sterling, and that is a bit more than the

The First American Cent.
Vermont was the first state to issue copper cents. In June 1785, she granted the authority to Reuben Harmon, Jr., to make money for the state for one year. In October of the same year, Connecticut granted the right to coin 10,000 pounds in copper cents, known as the Connecticut cent. Of 1875, Massachusetts, in 1786, established a mint and coined \$60,000 in cents and half cents. In the same year New Jersey granted the right to coin \$10,000 at fifteen coppers to the shilling. In 1781 the continental congress directed Robert Morris to investigate the matter of Government coinage. He proposed a standard based on the Spanish dollar, consisting of 100 units, each unit to be called a cent. His plan was rejected. In 1784, Jefferson proposed to Congress that the smallest coin should be of copper, and that 200 of them should pass for one dollar. The plan was adopted, but in 1785, 100 was substituted. In 1799, the coinage of copper cents, containing 264 grains, and half cents in proportion, was authorized. Their weight was subsequently reduced, and in 1863 the nickel cent was introduced, weighing forty-eight grains and consisting of 95 per cent of copper, and the remainder of tin and zinc.

MOULD IS LOVELY.

That On Preserved Fruit, Under Microscope.

Mould over jelly or preserved fruit is justly regarded as a pest; yet scientists who have studied it under the microscope declare that the mould plant is a most lovely creation. These plants are associated in our minds with death and decay, and so an unreasoning prejudice has developed against them. In many cases they do accompany decay, but, as the lily rises above the foulest pond, so a mould may develop its frostlike fineness and cleanliness, its exquisite coloring, in the midst of putrefaction. Mould plants will thrive also in the cleanest soil, and they are wholly harmless.

The most common of the moulds is the Penicillium glaucum, well known to housekeepers as the fungus against which a fight is made at canning time. It first forms a greyish green mat and, if removed, gives forth a fine, powdery dust. Under the microscope it is a wonderful thing, but housekeepers are probably less interested in its form than in methods of combating it.
