The Parnellites Defeated.

London, Dec. 23.--A dispatch from
Buenos Aires says there is
the slightest doubt that Hennessy is
elected by a majority of at least 500.

Dublin, Dec. 23.--At Carrick-on-Suir,
Fingery last night a crowd of Parnellites
attempted to make a bonfire of a pile of
copies of Davitt's paper, the Labor World,
whereupon they were attacked by a party
of Davitt's sympathizers and a sharp scrim-
mage ensued. The fight ended in the rout
of the Parnellites, several of whom were
wounded.

The Y. M. C. A. in Paris.

Paris, Dec. 23.--A company known
as La Societe Anonyme Immobiliere de
Paris has been organized here with a
capital of 500,000 francs. The company
will hold the property of the Y. M. C. A.
in Paris and will erect a handsome building for
the Y. M. C. A.

Catholic Missions in Madagascar Pil-
laged.

London, Dec. 23.--Advice from Madaga-
scar dated Nov. 6 states that a body of Hovas
pillaged the Catholic missions at Anta-
naria. Father Montant was wounded
while endeavoring to protect the property.
The Hovas attacked the house of the
French vice-consul and the Comptoir
Franco-Malgache and other prominent buildings.

Canadian Turkeys in England.

London, Dec. 23.--Canadian turkeys
have met with a fair sale in the London
Christmas markets during the last few
days. They arrived in fair condition, but
the price fetched by them is 40 or 50 per
cent. lower than that brought by high-
land birds, averaging only 6d per pound.
This is chiefly due to the fact that the birds
are much smaller than the English variety.

Jane Wren's A. Duchess.

London, Dec. 23.--Upon the day that
the Duchess of Northumberland died polite
society in London was eagerly waiting for
the announcement of a superb wedding and
for the Duke of Portland's wife at a
cost of 1,000 guineas. The sad case of Jane
Collins, who died from anthrax, the result
of handling furs which she was employed to
sort, appeared in the newspapers with the
paraphrase relating to the young Duchess's
robe, but did not attract half so much at-
tention.

Fourteen Men Burned.

London, Dec. 23.--Chinese advisers re-
port the execution of the sentences on the
villagers near Shanghai, China, for the
murder of fourteen salt inspectors

and the burning of the bodies of the
wounded and the dead. Last March these
salt inspectors made a raid on a village.
They wore no uniforms, and the villagers
mistook them for pirates. The inspectors
seized a pile of contraband salt, and while
removing it were attacked by villagers and
overpowered. Nearly all were only stung by
blows, but a visit to their boat showed the
villagers that they had attacked Govern-
ment officers, and fearful of severe punish-
ment, they decided to burn the boat, and
with it the bodies of the wounded inspec-
tors, to remove all traces of crime. So they
carried the injured men to the boat and,
despite their entreaties, set fire to it and
burned the whole. The chief criminal was
sentenced to decapitation, but committed
suicide before the day arrived. Four others
were strangled and four exiled after heavy
fines.

Mrs. Piercy Hanged.

London, Dec. 23.--Mrs. Tillie Piercy
was hanged this morning for the murder
of Mrs. Hogg and her baby. The crowd
outside the prison walls set up a shout
when the black flag, showing that the
woman was hanging on the scaffold, was
hoisted upon the prison flagstaff. During
the night the unfortunate woman was quiet
and resigned, and for several days she
was in company with the prison chaplain.
To the latter she confessed that the sentence
passed upon her was a just one, though she
said the evidence upon which she was con-
victed was false.

The crime for which Mrs. Piercy died
was committed in October. During the
morning of Oct. 5 the body of a woman,
subsequently identified as that of Mrs.
Hogg, was found in South Hampstead.
The dead woman's throat had been cut and
her skull fractured. The police, upon in-
vestigating the matter, found that Mrs.
Hogg had visited Mrs. Piercy on the
previous afternoon, taking her infant with
her, and that Mrs. Piercy had been seen
near the house of Mrs. Hogg. The police
found evidence of a bloody struggle was ob-
tained, and Mrs. Piercy was soon afterwards
arrested. At the coroner's inquest the
doctor for the murder was revealed.
Hogg's husband, the murderer, was a
woman, testifying to the fact that he had
been intimate with Mrs. Piercy. It was
also shown that the woman had quarreled
during the visit paid by Mrs. Hogg to Mrs.
Piercy, and finally the latter admitted that
Mrs. Hogg made a remark that she did not
like and that she (Mrs. Piercy) thereupon
assaulted and severely murdered Mrs.
Hogg. Mrs. Piercy then removed the
body in a perambulator to the place where
it was found, and the dead body of the
murdered woman's child was subsequently
found near the same spot. The trial fol-
lowed speedily after the inquest, when the
above facts were proven, and the woman
sentenced to be hanged.

The Koch Treatment.

Berlin, Dec. 23.--Wm. Degan, the New
York consumptive, has received his second
injection under the Koch system at Berlin.
The dose was one milligram. Nine hours
afterwards the symptoms of reaction com-
menced to be noticed, but they were not
marked. After four hours the patient
suffered from a slight hemorrhage in the
lungs, which caused him considerable
alarm. The doctors were soon able to con-
trol the hemorrhage and to restore the
patient to a state of comparative health.
The patient, named Lang, from Philadelphia,
died from hemorrhage of the lungs at the
Augusta Hospital after two weeks' treat-
ment, during which he received six in-
jections. At first he seemed to be rapidly im-
proving, and he expected to be soon dis-
missed as cured. Koch says he is in good
health, and fully able to continue his studies.

BUILDINGS BURNED.

KINROSS, Ont., Dec. 23.--The Dixon
Lumber and Shingle Mill, lately bought by
R. J. Mills, was burned on Sunday. No
insurance. The mill was to have started
work this week. Following are the losses:

\$3,000; W. T. Craig, shingle mill and saws,
\$500; Mansfield, wood, \$1,000.

TORONTO LETTER.

Against Sunday Street Cars--A Chapter
of Accidents.

Toronto, Tuesday, Dec. 23.--The
following resolution was unanim-
ously adopted by the Methodist minis-
ters' meeting yesterday:

"That the Methodist ministers' meeting heart-
ily indorses the action of the city council in
having decided against permission for the run-
ning of Sunday street cars, and that they com-
mend that body for refusing to submit the
question of Sunday street cars to the people,
inasmuch as such a vote would imply the
right of the municipality to set aside or
annul the decision of the city council in the
matters of the kind, and thereby place a
question of Sunday street cars in the hands
of a money bag."

Justice Meredith gave judgment in the
case of S. Greenhalgh & Sons, Montreal,
against Caldwell, Burton & Co., Montreal.
Plaintiffs sued to recover \$10,000 damages
for the infringement of a patented paper.
Judgment for the plaintiffs without dam-
ages, the judge finding that the defendants
did not infringe the plaintiffs' rights in-
tentionally. The injunction, however, re-
straining the defendants from using the
paper in question was made perpetual.

tenders for the same at an early day.

The city council last evening again de-
clined submitting the question of Sun-
day cars to the people for decision. The
division was a narrow one, 17 against 10,
as compared with 30 against 8 on Friday.

RIDICULOUS WAR TALK.

A Commission to Investigate the Behring
Sea Matter Favored.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 23.--The argument
in favor of a commission to inquire into the
condition of things in Behring Sea is gain-
ing strong support. The fact that the
United States Government has received
conflicting reports from its own special
agents on the subject has led to the ex-
pression of opinion that the Secretary of State
will be put in a very embarrassing position if he
should accept one set of reports and reject the
other. Senator Frye, of Maine, is the
latest convert to the arbitration policy.

Mr. Frye, after reviewing the correspond-
ence between Secretary Blaine and Lord
Salisbury, said: "Mr. Blaine's argument
was that English poaching should cease on
the ground of good morals among nations.
