The Railway Strike Seems to be Ending,

But the Trades Strike in Chicago is Just Starting.

Thousands in Several Lines of Industry Will Walk Out-Severeign's Appeal -Trains Moving as Usual.

SOVEREIGN'S M ANIFESTO. The manifesto of General Master Workman Sovereign to Knights of Labor issued to-night, states that a crisis has been reached in the affairs of the nation that endangers the peace of the republic. Every fibre in the civil structure is strained to establish a direct line of steamers between the breaking point. The shadow of factional hatred hovers over our fair land with terrible forebodings. The arrogant lash of superiority is being applied by the corporations with relentless fury, and the chasm between the masses and classes is growing deeper and wider with each succeeding day. If peace is restored and this nation saved from acts repulsive to the conscience of Christian people, there must be wiseaction, and that quickly. SOURING ON PULLMAN. CHICAGO, Ill., July 11.—The report is current that the directors of the Pullman Palace Car Company are on the brink of revolt over the dictatorial policy of the president. Mr. Pullman's present holdings in the company are said to aggregate less than \$500,000 out of a total capital stock of \$3,600,000. The annual meeting of the stockholders is but three weeks off. It is stated that a number of large stockholders have combined to bring about a change in the head of the corporation in order to protect the future of this great property in-

terest. ARTHURS AGAINST SOVEREIGN. CLEVELAND, Ohio, July 11 .- Chief Engineer P. M. Arthur, speaking last night of the expected general strike of the Knights of Labor, said: "I suppose Mr. Sovereign has the right to order the strike or he would not do it. I think it is not right. even though he has the authority to order out thousands of workingmen who have large families to support." Mr. Arthur insisted that the engineers are not involved

in this strike. New York, July 11 .- The Knights in Brooklyn say they will not obey Sovereign's order to strike.

SACRAMENTO FEELS EASIER. SACRAMENTO, Cal., July 11. - Strike leader Knox has wired President Towne that the members of the A. R. U. will see safely to their destinations all trains on condition that no Pullmans are attached to any train and that all employes, discharged for refusing to handle Pullman cars, shall be reinstated without prejudice. The strikers will not oppose the troops. The people are beginning to breathe easier.

THE BACKBONE BROKEN. CHICAGO, July 11 .- For the first time since the beginning of the great strike the mails were moved yesterday without inter-

ruption. UNION STOCK YARDS, Ill., July 11 .-Trains were sent out unmolested, and quietness prevailed everywhere. The feeling here is that the backbone of the

strike has been broken. Dispatches from Spokane, Henderson, Kan., Decatur, Ill., Little Rock, Ark., New Orleans, Frankfort, Ind., Denver, Col., Indianapolis, Ind., St. Louis, Mo., Fort Wayne, Ind., Duluth, Minn., and ended, trains running as usual and every-

M. C. R. AND G. T. R. ALL RIGHT. DETROIT, Mich, July 11 .- All Michigan Central trains, freight and passenger are running on time. The same is true of all roads using the Union terminal station. The strikers at the Brush street depot have not returned to work, but all passenger trains on the Chicago and Grand Trunk, Detroit, Grand Haven and Milwaukee and Lake Shore are moving on time.

CHICAGO TRADES STRIKE. CHICAGO, July 11 .- The great Chicago Building and Trades Council last night

passed the following reslutions: "Resolved, That it is the sense of this council to strike, and that the organizations already out remain out, and the remainder be out not later than Saturday morning; and that the council give its fullest support to allorganizations affiliated. We request all members to keep away from railroad property, and if martial law be de-

clared to remain in their homes." This council is composed of members of the 26 affiliated organizations, and is the most powerful single labor body in Chicago. Among the unions affiliated with it are the carpenters numbering 5,500 and the plumbers 7,000. According to the resolution all will lay down their tools before

Saturday. As yet the street railway men are at work and there is no tieup of the urban transportation though it is said that the conductors, motormen and drivers will go out on call. The K. of L. will stand by their organizations and its members will number 10,000 in this city.

At 4 p.m. to-day 4,000 cigar makers will walk out. Already the tinners, numbering 1,000, are reported out; and 120 bicycle repairers of Warming Schube & Co. did not return to work this morning. Bakers in 50 bakeries refused to work until the boycott is settled. The waiters in the hotels and restaurants to the number of 3,000 will go out soon, but the hour has not yet been or a general one depends largely upon the results of the conference of labor leaders here tomorrow, which has been called by President Samuel Gompers of the American
