NO BOATING TILL END OF SUMMER

When the Waterworks Dam Will Be Completed-The Present Stage of the Work.

It will be a source of regret to the lovers of aquatic sports in London to learn that the outlook for the coming season is not more promising than it was last year.

The dam at Springbank will not be completed until some time in September, and until then there will not be a sufficient depth of water in the river to permit of boating to any extent. Engineer Moore, when seen by an Advertiser representative, said that only about one-third of the dam has been done so far, but that portion done is the most difficult part of the The contractor is now in a work. position to go forward with the work, and will be able to continue work unhindered by moderate rises in the river due to rains. When the dam is completed the river will be the same height it was prior to the carrying away of the former dam. The sluicegates in the new dam will permit of the backwater being released at any time, and by their use the river can be kept clean. The frequency of this cleaning will depend largely on circumstances. The sun and the wind tend to bring the fungoid growths to the surface of the water. The presence of boats on the river also tends to keep the river clean, as the action of the agitates and aerates the water, and the more boats there are on the

river the cleaner it will be.
All danger of a flood from the spring freshets is now past, and the river is falling rapidly. There was very little ice in the branches this year. Hunt Bros. ran their mill all through the flood this year, something they never did before. The largest floods known on the river have, however, occurred at a season of the year when there was no ice, they being the great July flood and the May flood three years
