London, Friday, June 2.

THE police magistrate of London, Ont., has decided that there is no legal standard of time. There is an immense opportunity for the technical judicial luminaries of Osgoode Hall to quash all convictions for breaches of the liquor law. How can a fine be imposed on a liquor dealer for selling after a certain hour, say 7 o'clock, when legally no such hour as 7 o'clock exists?—[Toronto News.]

The decision of the London magistrate is simply that solar time is the only standard until the Ottawa Parliament deposes otherwise. Wherever standard time is the rule, legal difficulties can be successfully raised both in regard to opening and closing of liquor bars and in reference to banking and other arrangements that are conducted "by the clock."

AT ORANGEVILLE Mr. J. F. Wood, one of the new subordinate Ministers appointed at Ottawa, caused some astonishment by asserting that the tax burdens upon Canadians were very light. That was not the view set forth by the representative farmers who interviewed the members of the Government earlier in the day. But Mr. Wood met his match. The Mail report says:

"Mr. Wood asked anyone in the audience what he would do in endeavoring to bring about tariff reform with the United States, he found the United States were not agreeable."

A Voice—Give us tariff reform with Great Britain, too. (Applause.)

Another Voice—Go back to the system before 1878.

Mr. Wood—Yes; with its low prices. The Voice—Low prices, indeed, at that time barley fetched \$1.40 per bushel and now it is only 26 cents.

The understrappers will have to learn their lessons better. The farmers down them at the first round. The apologists for the N. P. are no longer believed; they are simply laughed at. Radical Tariff Reform is on the top!

SHALL CITY MONEY BE SPENT FOR DOMINION PURPOSES?

If there is any hitch in the holding of the militia camp in this city, the responsibility must lie jointly between the London City Council and the Government at Ottawa.

Certain expenditures are necessary on the camp grounds, which are the property and entirely under the control of the Administration at Ottawa. These will cost \$1,500, and the Ottawa Government desires the taxpayers of London to pay the money.

A majority of the members of the council say they would vote the money if the Minister of Militia would write a letter to say that the camp will be permanently located here.

Meanwhile the Minister of Militia is on a tour through British Columbia and no one in authority at Ottawa pays any attention to the appeal of the council, and the aldermen refuse to accept Mr. Carling's assurances that a letter will be forthcoming if the council will only vote the money.

Where were the aldermen while Parliament was sitting a month or two ago? Then Hon. Mr. Patterson pledged the Government that the camps would be permanently located at the most convenient points in future, London being the site chosen for the camp for the western district. That public pledge surely holds good. The camp must be held here, no matter who provides the necessary buildings. That was printed out by the ADVERTISER months ago. The pledge of the Administration is recorded in Hansard. It cannot be broken without breaking faith not only with London but with the whole country. The camp is secured for London not as a matter of favor but because of the excellence of the situation and the abundance of good water—whichever, by the way, the city supplies free of cost. Why, then, the over-burdened taxpayers of London may well ask, is it necessary to offer a bribe of municipal money to the Government at Ottawa to secure that which has already been provided for? As Ald. Taylor says, there is no reason why the Government should not put up the buildings at the general expense. They are needed for the common good, not for the welfare of the taxpayers of London, who find it hard enough to pay their own taxes. There is an additional reason why the money for these works should come from Ottawa: The Government there is constantly boasting of the large surplus of public money that it has collected over and above the needs of the public service. Why should it not pay its debts as well as other governments? The improvements required for its property here are legitimate expenditures which should certainly be borne by the Ottawa Government and not by the city, and aldermen should once and for all withdraw their offers to undertake the work.

THE TRUTH ABOUT THE WORLD'S FAIR.

A good deal has been written, naturally pro and con, regarding the great World's Fair now in progress at Chicago. It has been stated that the exhibition is not as yet complete, and there have been wild outcries respecting alleged extortionate rates for boarding accommodation.

As to alleged incompleteness, any such fair requires finishing touches for weeks after it is formally opened, but there is enough in this exhibition, as it at present stands, to occupy the attention of an intelligent observer for a year, if he undertakes to inspect everything that is on view. In fact, it is simply a world in itself that is presented to the gaze of the visitor, and as no person would expect to take in the whole earth within a few days, neither is it possible for anyone to see one tithe of what is shown in the greatest city of the west. But even though one may have a great deal of time at his disposal, nothing would yield a greater harvest of interest, pleasure and information than a visit to this exhibition.

Never before in the history of the world has there been any such display, and in all human probability there will not be again another exhibition to equal it. As compared with the Chicago exhibition, that at Philadelphia, some years ago, great though it was, was as a child's toy house compared to a large wholesale store. Every nation is represented by its own people, as well as by its own buildings. The German or Irish village, for example, is so reproduced that one might easily imagine that he had been translated into scenes of 1,000 years ago.

Now, with regard to the charges of extortion. There were naturally some attempts at exorbitant exactions for food and lodging at the beginning of the fair, but the outcries which have been re-echoed far and wide were simply protests from people who were being vigorously jumped upon by the Chicago press and by the authorities of the World's Exposition. The average cost of living in Chicago is really no greater than at Toronto or Montreal. One can live as expensively or as moderately as he chooses. It is true that the visitor pays a little more for a cup of coffee or a sandwich inside the grounds than outside, but that is only reasonable, seeing that the restaurants within the grounds pay the management a substantial sum for the franchise. But the visitor need not buy anything within the grounds except some small refreshment in the middle of the day, as the prudent plan is to have breakfast and supper before and after sight-seeing.

Every facility for supplying all needed information is at hand. The police officers are numerous and the guards and officials within the grounds are ready to give every aid to visitors. In fact, no person need be exposed to either extortion or danger of any kind who conducts himself with such ordinary prudence as is necessary to visit even a large Canadian city. It is always wise to go into a large city for the first time by daylight. It greatly facilitates the making of the necessary arrangements, and adds to the comfort of the visitor.

As to the fair, it is beyond the power of language to portray the beauty of the buildings, the vastness and variety of the exhibits from every clime, or the extraordinary human interest that surrounds the people who have come from the uttermost parts of the earth to represent the ethnological and industrial conditions in every part of the globe. No ordinary university could teach a person as much in a year as can be learned at Chicago within a fortnight. To have witnessed the Columbian Exposition of 1893 will be looked back to by every visitor as the event of a lifetime.

Was not that a statesmanlike reply which Mr. Clark Wallace, controller of customs, made to his fellow Conservative, Dr. Henry, at the Orangeville gathering? His wing of the Conservative party must be getting beyond control of the Ottawa ring.

A DEMON THROUGH DRINK.

John Dennis Kills His Wife, His Father and the Sheriff—A Posse in Pursuit.

LAUREL, Del., June 2.—John Dennis, heretofore a hard-working negro, drove into Salisbury with a load of strawberries yesterday. After selling the berries he got drunk. On reaching home his father re-monstrated with him, and John picked up his gun and said he would leave the house for good. His wife ran after him begging him to return. He leveled the gun at her and fired, and she fell mortally wounded. The murderer's mother upbraided him, whereupon he tried to kill her but she escaped. The father who was 78 years of age tried to interfere. Young Dennis placed the muzzle of his weapon to the old man's breast and fired. The father fell dead. The murderer had two hours' start when intelligence of the tragedy was brought to town. Deputy Sheriff Hearn with a posse started in pursuit. Dennis was overtaken in the woods. He agreed to surrender, but as he approached the posse he raised his gun and fired, killing the sheriff instantly. The posse were so startled that they allowed the negro to escape. He is still at large. Scores of men are after him. He will be lynched if captured.
