J. R. Ritchter, an officer of plaintiff company, to attend at his own expense and answer certain questions upon examination for discovery, and produce documents. Division Court: Sharkey vs. Williams.—P. H. Bartlett (London), for plaintiff, appealed from judgment of Ferguson, J. (1 O.W.R. 135), in action tried at Ottawa, to recover damages for illegal seizure and removal of a plano, which plaintiff had purchased from defendants on the usual hire receipt plan, and which upon three payments of \$5 each becoming in arrear they removed from plaintiff's premises on July 7, 1901. The contract provided that the purchase money was to become due on default of any payment, and defendant's agent demanded \$115 balance due, and not receiving it, removed the piano. Subsequently the defendants gave the piano back to plaintiff's agent and received the payments in arrear and \$5 costs of removal, the latter under protest. The trial judge held that the defendants had done nothing which they were not entitled to do under the contract, and dismissed with costs.


HOW HE GOT A DOWER FOR HIS OWN BRIDE
