ARE THEY WASTING THE CITY'S CASH?

**Chairman Wyatt Asserts Talbot
Street Contractors Throw-
ing Good Gravel Away.**

Ald. Wyatt, chairman of the board of
works, has been making the rounds,
and has discovered some more faults on
the part of paving contractors.
He challenges any business man to deny
that the city is losing money—perhaps
several hundreds of dollars—by the action
of the contractors who have charges of the
new brick pavement on Talbot street, be-
tween King and Carling streets. Good
gravel which at present forms the base of
the roadway might be used as a foundation
for the pavement, according to Ald.
Wyatt; and yet the contractors are cart-
ing it away and replacing it with new
broken stone at \$7 per cord.

Of course, the sticking point is that the
contractors, who believe that they know
what the new roadway requires, assert
that the old gravel won't do. Ald. Wyatt's
fellow-members of the council take the
same view, and ridicule the chairman's
assertions.

There is enough gravel at present in
the roadway to supply all that is needed
for the concrete base of the pavement,"
says Ald. Wyatt; but the contractors
are carting it into back yards on Ridout
street.

It is up to others to investigate the
roadway and find out where the gravel
is, if he is.
